There is no passion so active and powerful, nor one that more enslaves its votary than love. In this state he could not long survive. He fell a victim to the frowns of the fair—and his exit was calculated to awaken no other emotion than a sigh of pity, and the sorrowful exclamation of "Alas! poor crazy Dick!"
