GALUSHA DENIES CHARGE.

Held Under \$1,000 Bail for Trial Under Illegitimate Child Act.

ADAMS, Mass., Sept. 8.—Lyman A. Galusha, 22, of Windsor, pleaded not guilty yesterday morning in the district court to charges of violation of the illegitimate child act, preferred against him by Evelyn Goodell, the 18-year-old Windsor girl, who has accused two others besides Galusha of being the father of her infant daughter.

Immediately after the case had been called, the court ordered it continued to Sept. 29. Bail in the amount of \$1,000 was furnished.

Then came the question of the disposition of the Goodell girl for the interim. The court finally decided that she should remain under the care of Deputy Sheriff John J. Thompson. The place of refuge was kept secret, as the court declared she must be kept away from outside influences until after she has told her story.

The father of the girl wished to take her home, but the court declared that in view of the fact that the girl did not care to go home, he would order otherwise.


