

cited to him in print, by types, than if it should
be given to him by his neighbor, by word of mouth.
It is the same thing.

Skill in the manual of hoeing and ploughing can
never make a farmer. It makes only an apprentice
to persons making a settlement in the West; for per-
sonal knowledge is mostly so—that they will be able
to make judicious selections, and proceed in the es-
tablishing of their new homes to best advantage,

at the option of the Government; and at the rate

and a half pounds of good hard dipper tallow can-
dles to each hundred rations.

The best required shall be delivered on the order
of the commanding officer of each station, either
in bulk or by the single ration, and shall consist
of the best and most choice portions of the carcass;
the pork to be No. 1 prime mess pork, and the groceries
of the best quality of the kinds named, subject to
inspection.
