**GOOD ROAD SUPERVISORS
NEEDED.**

Several of the country newspapers
in eastern Washington are printing
the new road law and calling the at-
tention of the county officials to it.
The law provides that the county
commissioners shall divide their re-
spective counties into suitable and
convenient road districts, the size of
each to permit personal oversight
and management by one supervisor.
Every county may have more than
24 road districts.

Supervisors are to be appointed
from among the qualified electors,
one for each district, and their com-
pensation is not to exceed \$4 a day
for time and labor actually performed.
When any road district has a
good roads association, the supervi-
sor is to be appointed from a list fur-
nished by such association. Formerly
the supervisors were elected by the
people in their respective districts.
The supervisors are to take charge
of all public roads in the district,
keep them clear from obstructions
and in good repair, and destroy or
cause to be destroyed, at least once
a year, all pest weeds growing on any
of the roads. The supervisor has

general supervision of all the work
on the roads ordered done by the
county commissioners.

Increasing recognition of the im-
portance of good roads and of the
necessity of destroying weeds makes
the office of road supervisor one to
which thoroughly competent and en-
ergetic men should be appointed.

**TELLS STRANGE
TALE TO GUARD**

Father and Son Go to Penitentiary
Handcuffed Together.—Both
Stole Horses.

Handcuffed together, enroute to
the penitentiary, and sentenced for
horse stealing, Orvel Connors and B.
Connors, his father, left for Walla
Walla today, guarded by Barney
Easterbrook.

Estranged for 18 years, the son
has not recognized the man chained to
him as his father, and the old man
is begging the officers to keep the
news from his boy.

This striking human interest story
was revealed in Judge Steiner's court
today when old man Connors stood
up for his sentence. The judge gave
him an indeterminate period, and on
his way back to the cell he told Sher-
iff Webb his strange story.

A Tale of the Past.
Twenty years ago old man Connors
married unhappily, and after living
six months with his wife they sepa-
rated. A son was subsequently born.
Afterwards, when divorced, Connors
married again, and saw nothing more
of his son by his first marriage.

This son, Orvel Connors, was last
week sentenced to Walla Walla for
horse stealing, and today was lodged
in jail here.

B. Connors, who says he is Orvel
Connors father, was sentenced today
by Judge Steiner for selling a stolen
horse at Chelan a few weeks ago.
The old man talked with young Con-
nors in the cell, and established the
relationship to his own satisfaction,
without telling the boy of it.

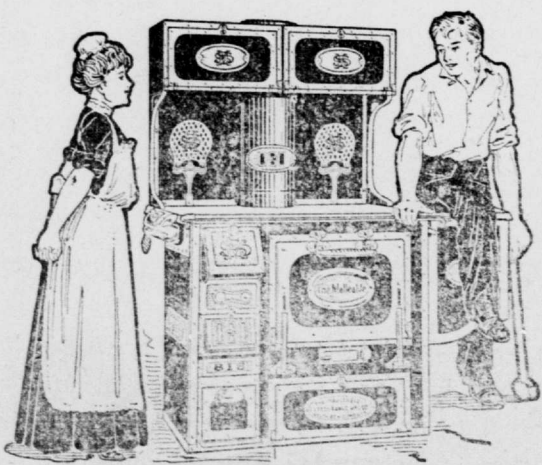
