

ZELAYA A MAN WITHOUT A CONSCIENCE

EDUCATED IN SPAIN AND HAS UNDYING HATRED FOR AMERICANS—REGARDS HIMSELF AS MODERN NAPOLEON.

Whether the United States or enemies of his own blood be first to overthrow him, certain it is the Jose Santos Zelaya will be known to the world as a man without a conscience.

A fratricide, wading through blood to accomplish the ends of his per-

verted ambition, Zelaya long has been a synonym for terror in revolt-ridden Nicaragua, where now the revolutionist army seems at last to have accomplished the tyrant's overthrow.

Zelaya is an opportunist, a sensualist, a thug.

And at the same time he possesses the faculty of leading men that has made him supreme for years in the fever-plagued, tropical, peppery little republic.

What He Looks Like.
Zelaya is dark, swarthy, though of

unmixed blood. A man whose blood is unmixed is marked in Nicaragua, because most of the people there who are not wholly Indians—and these include the common classes—are half-breeds, octoroons, negritos and European adventurers. Zelaya's father was a rich coffee planter. He himself was educated in Spain and grew up as a youth to hate Americans. When he returned to the land he was to rule he brought this hate with him and also a nature free from control and coupled with vanity.

On state occasions, before his accouterments were spattered with swamp mud in his flight from Managua, Zelaya used to smear his face with rice powder to make him look a real "blanco" of unmixed blood.

When election day would come around, the event was a farce. The standing army of Nicaragua was marched up and voted for Zelaya. Then the government got the army drunk.

Consequently, by Zelaya's orders, there were more opportunities to join the army before the election. And afterward, if the "army" ventured to beat up a few Americans, or burn an American warehouse or two, nobody cared, least of all Zelaya.

Bluffed U. S. Once.
The United States government was once awed by Zelaya—he thought, and he dreamed great dreams of becoming a Napoleon of the tropics, bereft of conscience as he was.

Then the election became more corrupt, the army was strengthened for voting purposes and made more intoxicated, also for voting purposes. And meanwhile the people of Nicaragua stood for all those things. Zelaya, man without conscience, still held aloof for tampering with the Catholic religion of his country.

As an opportunist Zelaya first shone. He studied government in France, Belgium, London and New York. He married a beautiful woman and all the country soon sympathized with Mme. Zelaya.

As a sensualist, there was no outrage against his country's womanhood that he stopped at.

Tortured Young Girls.
The parents of young girls whom he had his troops lock up in his palace have gone to Zelaya's torture

chambers in great numbers. Some have never come back.

As an autocrat Zelaya carried out to the end anything cruel or unjust that he fancied. He has had only one minister in his cabinet, and this man merely was a professional flatterer. If anyone brought bad news to the palace he was likely to be kicked down the front steps by Zelaya himself, or to be beaten by bodyguards. Consequently, Zelaya, the autocrat, hemmed in on all sides by his foes, was ignorant of the volcano under him until it was in a high state of eruption.

Is First Class Thug.

As a thug Zelaya stands first class among all the Central American thugs who have mounted shaky presidential seats. He seized the property of others, especially Americans. He hated all gringos, as the foreigners are called in the unhealthy, noisome land.

Like his forerunners in revolution and flight from power, Castro, Zelaya played the Castra game. He gave rich concessions, for bribes, to Americans and others, and then revoked these concessions at will. People could not stand the effects of this conduct long.

Property of Americans was burned and they were ill-treated. But the state department at Washington was lazy—it always has seemed to be lazy in such cases. Probably this laziness was for the sake of peace in the Pan-American family, but it made Zelaya actually think that Uncle Sam was afraid of him. So in this temper he went on with the conduct which has made him an international reprobate.

Orgies in Palace.
His sensuality reached a climax when he began breaking into convents and seizing girl victims for his orgies in the palace. The troops did his bidding, being well grogged and heedless of the consequences.

When the convents were desecrated by Zelaya, Gen. Juan Estrada, one of the tyrant's own commanders, led the long-threatened revolt. Now Zelaya is in flight, and it will be a wonder if he escapes alive.

Yet this is the man of whom was spoken recently: "He is to be the Bolivar of the twentieth century, the

pacifier and ruler of a united Central America, the Napoleon of a re-organized isthmus."

Such was the fame of Zelaya, now fled, and thus has the reward of ignominy come to him because he is the man without a conscience.

Not in Fire Limits.

During the past several days there has been considerable comment on the fact that the Great Northern Railway company is building a frame express shed north of the new depot. It has been generally understood that the Great Northern right of way was within the fire limits and censure has been directed towards the city administration for allowing a frame building to be erected at that place. The ordinance, however, limits the fire district to the westerly line of the Great Northern right of way, consequently the railway company is within its rights in erecting frame buildings on its own right of way. The present depot is to be removed to the foot of Palouse street and though the city administration would like to keep out all frame buildings from that district, yet the railway company is within its rights in building whatever it pleases on its own right of way.

E. T. Balch will leave the first of the week for Colorado as a representative for the Wenatchee Valley Fruit Growers association. He will attend the apple show at Denver and will also make a tour of the fruit districts of Colorado before the show convenes and confer with the associations relative to amending the Lafean apple box measure, making the northwest apple box the standard package. Mr. Balch expects to be gone for several weeks.
