PLEASURE TRIP FOR SUNDAY

Special Train Will Leave at 9 A. M. for New Town of Merritt.

The first pleasure excursion to leave Wenatchee is scheduled for next Sunday morning. A special train will leave here at 9 a. m. for Merritt and will leave that place at 6 p. m., arriving here in the early evening. A special fare of \$1.75 has been secured for the round trip and stops will be made at all stations between Wenatchee and Merritt.

F. A. Reynolds is the promoter of the excursion to this place and it is with the idea of acquainting the people of Wenatchee with Merritt as the place for a summer home. Year by year the local people are beginning to appreciate the fact that summer homes are a necessity, but it is also realized that they must be located convenient to the railroad and not too far away, making it possible for the business man to locate his family at his home and then make occasional trips back and forth. There is no more beautiful place in the state for a summer home than Merritt and it has the advantage of being but a few minutes' ride from the city. The trip Sunday will give an opportunity to look into this matter.

County Option the Issue.

Minneapolis, Minn., July 28.—John Lind for governor on a county option platform is the program of the leaders in the democratic state convention which was called to order here today for the nomination of a state ticket to be voted for at the November election. The principal fight in the convention promises to be over the question of the adoption of a county option resolution. It is planned to have the resolution fight come first, as that will decide the status of John Lind in the convention. It is well known that Mr. Lind could not be persuaded to accept the nomination except on a county option platform. Congressman W. S. Hammond, who, next to former Governor Lind, has been most prominently mentioned for the head of the ticket, has given the delegates to understand that he does not care for the nomination. In the event of the defeat of the Lind forces, therefore, the convention will probably name Judge C. W. Stanton of Bend, John Jeswold of Duluth, or some other equally prominent democrat as the standard bearer in the coming campaign.

Saloons May Bar Out Tickers.

Appleton, Wis., July 28.—Whether tickers giving stock quotations and sporting news shall be continued in saloons in this state will be decided at the annual convention of the Wisconsin Retail Liquor Dealers' association, which began a three days' session here today with a large and representative attendance.

Summer Meeting of Auto Engineers.

Detroit, Mich., July 28.—The Society of Automobile Engineers opened its summer meeting here today for a three-days' session. FAITH IN COUNTRY REWARDED

Bought 6,700 Acres Five Years Ago; Is Now Rich.

Some day north central Washington will be known as the abode of more rich men than any other agricultural or horticultural section in the country. Scarcely a day passes that one or two of these embryonic millionaires from some of the remote corners of the apple empire does not appear on the streets of Wenatchee, the capital of the apple kingdom. The number of rich men in and around Wenatchee at the present time is limited chiefly by the faith that citizens in this locality five or six years ago possessed in the future of what was then a barren waste. One of these far-sighted pioneers was in the city yesterday and the World man had the privilege of making his

acquaintance.

Five years ago F. B. Chapman was a wholesale leather dealer in Billings, Mont. Thinking the opportunities of investment might be still better further on west, he came out to Ephrata, Wash. After looking around a bit, he purchased 6,700 acres of raw land just west of the lower end of Moses lake, paying \$5 per acre. His friends and even local residents said the man was a fool. It was simply a vast desert far away from civilization.

The second chapter reads differently. Last year Mr. Chapman sold 4,500 acres of his holdings at from \$15 to \$20 per acre—none less than \$15. He is holding the balance of it—2,200 acres—and nobody knows what he will get out of that. Most of it is good fruit land, and an inexhaustible supply of water is available by sinking 10-foot wells.

The sale of the 4,500 acres was made to the Milwaukee Railroad Townsite company, who in turn sold it to another development concern. They have platted the project into 40 acre tracts and have placed them on the market in the east. All of which, it may be observed, is not calculated to decrease the value of Mr. Chapman's remaining holdings.

SPENT HONEYMOON IN COUNTRY

Son of Former President and Wife Arrive in San Francisco.

San Francisco, July 28.—With peeled noses and decided coats of tan, giving evidence of a much out of doors honeymooning in the sunny climate of Santa Barbara, Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., and his wife arrived in San Francisco late last night, and are registered at a local fashionable hotel.

"I came back to San Francisco to start my work," said young Roosevelt. "We will live in this city and I want to make my home as near my work as possible. At present I cannot say where we will live."

The Roosevelts started on a house-hunting trip this morning. On the first of August Roosevelt will begin his duties as an employe of a local branch of a big eastern carpet and rug house.

Match Wolgast and McFarland.

New Orleans, La., July 28.—A 24-round contest between Ad Wolgast and Packey McFarland is a card which local promoters hope to present in New Orleans on Labor day. Tommy Walsh, matchmaker of the New Orleans Athletic club, has offered a \$10,000 purse.

NEW SERVICE FOR HAWAII

Six-Day Steamers to Be Put On From the Sound and Southern Points.

A six-day service between Puget Sound and the Hawaiian Islands is to be inaugurated by the American-Hawaiian Steamship company the first of 1911. The same service will become effective from Santa Cruz and San Francisco. At the present time the company has only a semi-monthly service to the islands, including a triangular course between Puget Sound and the other points mentioned.

The steamers Nebraskan, Isthmian and Pleiades will operate from the southern ports to islands direct, and the larger steamers, Columbia, Mexican, Virginia, Missouri, Alaskan and Arizona will alternate in the north and south service.

National Good Roads Congress.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., July 28.—A record breaking attendance marked the opening here today of the third annual congress of the National Good Roads association. The gathering will continue in session three days and will be addressed by many men who have been foremost in the movement to promote good roads throughout the country.
