Pittsburgh

PITTSBURGH, April 28.—Pure Oil was the only active stock in the Pittsburgh market. More than 4,600 shares changed hands at the uniform price of 23½, a small fraction above Thursday. Demand and supply was so evenly divided as to puzzle traders on the outside. Ohio Fuel Oil was the strongest of the gas stocks, advancing \$1 a share to 80. Manufacturers' Light and Heat was dull and unchanged at 70, a loss of \$2 from the high price of the week. The remainder of this group was without feature.

The rest of the market was dull and rather heavy. La Belle Iron declined \$1 to 81. American Window Glass Machine preferred lost 1½, selling at 88, while the common was a shade higher at 52½.

Grain and Produce.

CHICAGO, April 28.—Seventeen cents a bushel advance for wheat in less than half an hour made the Board of Trade yesterday sparkle with excitement, although the big margin calls enforced of late kept the aggregate of business relatively small. The upward leap of prices was largely due to a recovery from the effect of Thursday's semi-panic over peace rumors. After many nervous fluctuations the market closed unsettled, 3½ cents to 14½ cents net higher, with May at \$2.67½@2.68½ and July at \$2.23½@2.24½. Corn gained 2½ cents to 4½ cents, oats 1½ cents to 1½ cents and provisions 25 cents to 92 cents.

New York

NEW YORK, April 28.—A pronounced falling off in the volume of operations, dealings diminishing by one-quarter to one-third from their large totals of the two preceding sessions, was almost the only significant feature of yesterday's professional market. Less than half a score of leading stocks made up the great bulk of the business, chief among these again being United States Steel and related equipment and munitions, the metals and shippings and a few specialties controlled by the speculative interests.

The heavy covering movement which followed the large "extra" dividend on steel common seemed to have expended its force with little or no fresh buying power, while for their profit-taking was insured in at every favorable opportunity. Trading was marked by a succession of irregular advances and declines, final quotations in the prominent issues showing no change or a slight net loss.

Oil and Gas.

In the absence of important field developments, operators are discussing the prospects for another advance in the market. It seems to be the prevailing opinion that this is inevitable unless there are better results from field work. The kind of wells now coming in can neither prevent a decline or show an increase in production. According to reports from those in a position to know Mid-Continent

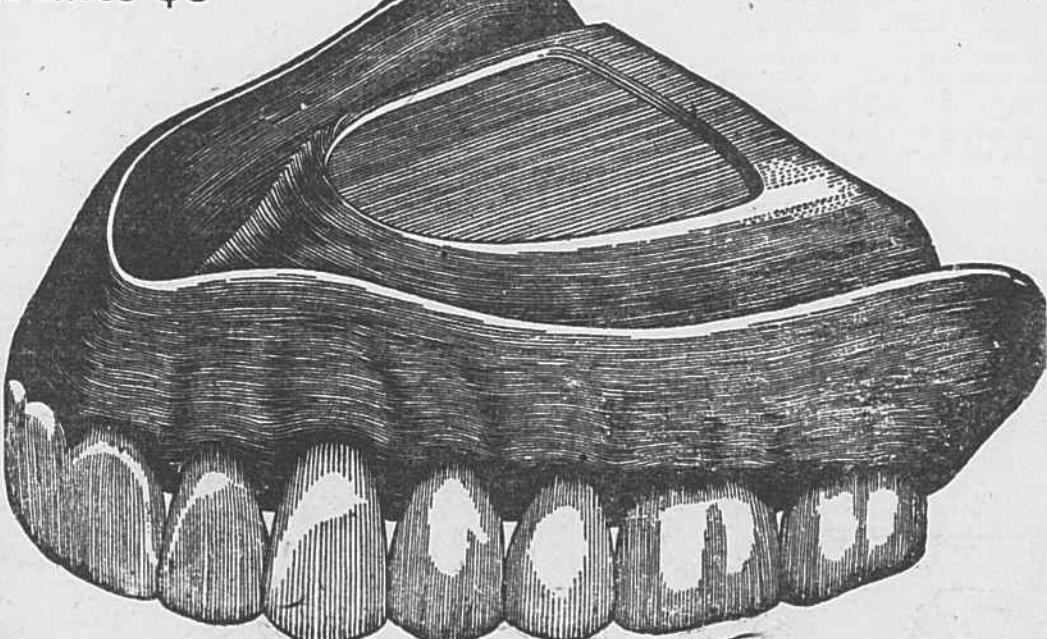
