School Children of City Disposed of 28,000 of Them.

Seventy-eight thousand one hundred OF U. S. CONVOYS and nine Red Cross seals were disposed or in this city during the campaign which was waged previous to Christmas day under the direct supervision of the Public Health Nursing Service. Of this number 28,000 were sold by the school children of the city.

Of the amount received from the sale of the little stickers the Public Health Service received the sum of \$550. The remainder of the preceeds goes to the state tuberculosis sanitarium.

This is by far the largest amount of seals ever disposed of in this city. Previous to this time an amount less than 50,000 were disposed of from year to year. The goal was set for 50,000 this year and was eventually raised to 75,000 and this further increased to the
