LYMAN H. HOWE's newest Travel Festival, which comes to the Grand on Wednesday is likely to introduce a new fad for women-feather work.

Feather work is possibly one of the oldest American arts, since it was in high favor among the Aztecs, whose civilization was the oldest in the Americas and which was, indeed, in advance of its European contemporaries. The Aztecs were, in fact, highly cultivated in everything but music. They singularly lacked a sense of music, as records which have come down from the Spanish invaders indicate.

The ancient Aztecs were gorgeous maniacs of woven feathers and the art of weaving and designing with feathers has been handed down from one generation to another. During the course of a motion picture tour of Mexico, which is a featured part of Mr. Howe's newest program, the Mexican feather work is shown in detail. This presents a method of applying a picture of applying soft feathers to the design of then carefully placing bits of feathers from brilliantly colored tropical birds to get the effects of coloring and shading. The feather picture shown in Mr. Howe's Mexican tour took two days to make, but by means of the film camera, the whole process is revealed in a few minutes.

May Allison at Princess.
