

WASHINGTON NEWS -- GOSSIP

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 2.—The statisticians at the War department have not as yet compiled casualties by regiments. This information was secured when an effort was made there to find out how many casualties there were in the 318th, 314th and 316th regiments of field artillery. These are the West Virginia regiments which, in large majority, landed at Newport News last Wednesday.

They were of the 80th division and the casualties of that division when last totaled were published at the time. They were then given as 1,141 battle deaths; 5,022 wounded; total 6,163.

There were 55,524 enlisted men from West Virginia in the military service when April 1, 1917, and November 1918. These figures include only enlisted men, no compilation having been made, by states, of the number of commissioned officers and army and navy clerks who were in service during the period mentioned.

While these figures included all West Virginians who were either enlisted as volunteers or inducted into the service under the provisions of the Selective Service law, as well as men of the National Guard, they do not take into consideration the place of residence of the 121,797 enlisted men who were serving in the regular army on April 1, 1917. There was no classification of these men according to states and territories and the War department states that it is now impracticable to undertake such a classification.

Walter S. Scott, erstwhile of Philadelphia, Pa., has been sworn in as assistant librarian of the United States Senate. This appointment was secured for him by Senator Sutherland. When the latter was elected to the Senate, Walter Scott who played a background but none the less important part in that event, became connected with the office staff. But prior to that, at the time when the then Congressman-at-large Sutherland, and shortly prior thereto, threw his old campaign hat into the senatorial ring, Walter Scott became attached to the Sutherland household.

Politics in the Second West Virginia district is his specialty, a conservative and unusually correct political judgment is his long suit. It now comes about that Mr. Scott is given a reward suitable to the valuable services he has performed for his chief. The position is remunerative, dignified and important. With its duties he is familiar, for he has served in that department in a lesser capacity before, and for years, under the patronage of Judge Dayton, when the latter was in the House. Mr. Scott held a high position in the document room of that branch. Mr. Scott came to Washington to take a position when Judge Dayton came here for his first term as a representative. He knows, and is known by, all the state's leading men. They will be pleased over the news of the fine position that he has landed.

An original person, it was announced today at Senator Sutherland's office, has been secured by Mr. Sutherland. He is a native of New York, at the rate of \$15 a month from July, 1913, and \$2 a month for minor child.

Governor John J. Cornwell will formally welcome them in the name of the state of West Virginia and its people.

Purinton, of Morgantown, chairman of the executive committee of the International Sunday School Association, reading: "The International Sunday School Association with auxiliaries in every state, speaking in behalf of a 20,000, 1st Sunday school enrollment, is unalterably hostile to the liquor traffic in any form and respectfully urges that you stand fast against the repeal of the war-time prohibition bill."
