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5,000 PERSONS AT AUTO SHOW

Officials Say Receipts and Expenditures Broke Even

Attendance at the spring Fairmont automobile show held last week was placed at 5,000 persons in an interview this morning by officials of the Hall Garage Co. According to the officials, the show just about broke even financially, receipts, and expenditures balancing each other; the amount received for tickets sold was about equal to the cost of the excellent entertainment afforded, while the money received for floor space sold to car dealers barely covered advertising expenditures.

Nearly thirty cars were sold during the show and dealers throughout the city state their sales are increasing considerably this week. In the opinion of some persons desiring to buy had been holding up their purchases until they had seen the various makes of cars at the automobile show. Twenty-eight cars, representing twenty different makes of machines, were on display.

Much favorable comment has

been heard concerning the kind of entertainment furnished the visitors by the committee handling the show. On Tuesday, the first day, a splendid concert by the Loyal Order of Moose band was given.

From Wednesday until Saturday, the remaining four days of the show, a troupe known as the "Liberty Revue" entertained the patrons. The troupe contained five singing girls and one dancing girl, and its efforts were heartily applauded by the show-goers. Especially pleasing also, was the musical given on the last four days by the Davies six-piece orchestra, which was brought here from Pittsburgh by the show management.

"As for myself, I am very well pleased with the outcome of the show," declared T. L. Cordray, president and manager of the Hall Garage Co., and president of the Fairmont Automobile Association. "I think we had as good a show as possible in the limited space, though credit is not due to us but to the many dealers and patrons who helped to make it a success."

"The attendance, of course," he continued, "was not quite so large as last year, when much more room was available, the show then being held in the Billy Sunday tabernacle."

"The Fairmont Automobile Association is going right ahead with plans for a bigger show next year, and from the interest shown this year, I think it will be accorded general support. I believe that an automobile show is something which the public looks forward to

as being a useful and delightful affair."

An auto show is one of the things that ought to be an annual event in the community. By next spring I hope to see a hall big enough to hold real automobile shows. The automobile association as a whole seems in favor of launching a campaign to build such a hall. There are a number of places in town where it could be located and there have been a number of plans suggested to raise the money, but those have been in the paper previously.

"I made a short address on this subject Saturday night before the guests at the show and everyone seemed heartily in favor of the idea. In my opinion, there should be two auto shows yearly, one in the spring, the other in the fall."

"A suitable hall would solve this problem. And then the hall could not only be used for auto shows but also for large meetings, conventions, community gatherings and other assemblies. Of course, just now, it is a question of money and of waiting till things are settled before anything can be done."
