

LIMERICK TAKEN BY FREESTATERS IN BATTLE TODAY

Irregulars Also Routed From Barracks and Postoffice at Waterford.

LONDON, July 21.—(By The Associated Press.)—The city of Limerick has been captured by the Irish national army, says a Central News dispatch this morning. The Nationalists took many prisoners, together with arms and ammunition.

Irregulars Routed at Waterford. LIMERICK, July 21.—The irregulars have retreated from the infantry and cavalry barracks and from the postoffice at Waterford, all of which now are in the hands of national troops, an official statement says. The irregulars are now retreating southward.

The town of Waterford on the southeast coast of Ireland, which was stoutly defended by Royal Irish constabulary, has been entered by national army forces who have already taken fifty prisoners, says the official report by the nationalists' general headquarters early today.

A message from Nengah, passed by the military censor today, says the situation in Limerick is very grave. So far as is known, there have been more than twenty killed and forty wounded in the fighting there.

City Being Shelled. CORK, July 21.—An official bulletin issued today by the Republican insurgents' headquarters here says that according to latest reports from Waterford, the national army forces are shelling the city from Mount Malinbeg. The fire was directed mainly against the cavalry barracks.

Free State troops yesterday took possession of the asylum and infirmary at Waterford, says the statement. Republican snipers frustrated repeated attempts of the enemy to cross the river in boats.

Owing to the fact that the cavalry barracks formed a fine target for the Free State troops, the building was evacuated by the Republicans. The Nationalists fire from across the river killed two civilians and wounded four others. Many inhabitants have left the city, and the streets have been cleared of pedestrians. A large party of Free State troops last night crossed King's Sound to the mainland in barges. They then marched to Waterford and occupied some posts on the outskirts of the city.

There was considerable activity on the part of both forces in County Clare and South Galway. The Free Staters were considerably harassed, says the official statement. Between Ballinacree and Woodford, between which two places communications were cut. A Republican attack outside a nearby fort resulted in the fleeing of the Free State troops with the loss of one killed and three wounded.

The official bulletin reports two attacks by a Free State armored car upon Republican posts in Limerick, which were repulsed, and also inconclusive fighting in the Limerick area on July 19. In East Limerick it continues, the Republicans are operating mobile columns. The Free State positions at Bruff and Rockhampton are continuously attacked.

The city of Cork is comparatively quiet, and a few telegraph wires are still open.

TIME EXTENDED FOR CAMP REGISTRATION

The period for registration for the Y. M. C. A. boys' summer camp has been extended and the camp period cut down to four weeks. This change was made at the meeting of the boys' work committee last night. It was learned last night that the middle period, August 7 to 19, was very unpopular with the boys. The other two periods were being filled up with applications, while the one had not received a single boy.

In view of this fact, the committee concluded that the best thing to do was to cut the camp period to four weeks. To accomplish the best results, it was decided to cut one week from the first of the camping period and the other from the last.

Under the new arrangement the camp will open on July 31 instead of July 24, and it will close on August 26 instead of September 2. The committee announced last night that the first period would still be reserved for the smaller boys. This period will run from July 21 to August 12. Beginning on August 12, the older boys will have the camp until it closes on August 26.

Since the camp has been postponed a week, it was thought best to extend the time in which to register for the camp. The application for camp may be had by calling at the Y. M. C. A. and they must be returned by July 29.

George Hartick, camp director, will continue the plans for camp and the additional time will enable him to complete the camp schedule. He plans to have a much larger camp program since the extra period was taken off.

RADIO AND HIGH TENSION. Keep away from the high tension wires, is the advice of Captain R. W. LaMar, head of the power department of the Monongahela Power & Railway Co., to local radio amateurs. WIFE OF JUDGE PLACED IN JAIL

Woman Accused of Killing Husband to Make Self-Defense Plea.

BECKLEY, W. Va., July 21.—Mrs. John Anderson, accused of killing her husband, judge of the Raleigh County Criminal Court, was locked up today by local authorities pending a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace C. C. Callaway. She had been allowed to remain last night at her home with her two children, but had been under guard of two members of the State Police.

Since the shooting Mrs. Anderson has made no statement, but from other members of the family it was understood that a plea of self defense would be made. It was reported last night that just before the shooting Mrs. Anderson had appealed to the State Police headquarters here for her husband and had been advised to get a warrant from one of the local justices.

She complained that Judge Anderson had beaten her and threatened the children. It was expected that the hearing would be held late in the afternoon.

District of Columbia Police Unable to See Way to Enforce Laws

WASHINGTON, July 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—How're you going to catch a law-breaking airman a thousand feet up in the air when you haven't a plane, balloon, or even a stepladder to get him with? That's the question agitating the District of Columbia police today on the eve of the going into effect of Washington's newest and most stringent traffic regulation.

Hereafter police will be expected to see that no flighty human flyer skims lower than the first safety limit; that none of them attempt any fancy flying; and—worst of all—that every flyer over Washington roofs has a license.

It's the last section of the new rule that bothers the cops most, for there's not a single plane owned by the entire police force with which to stop the reckless in mid-air to gruffly demand a sight of their permits; and what's more, say police officers, no one on the force sees any possibility of there ever being one.

Nevertheless, there's the law, and the cops are scratching their heads to find a way out. The air traffic rule is the direct outcome of the act of a commercial flyer who flew so low over the Lincoln Memorial, last Decoration Day, that he drowned out President Harding's voice during his address. Public and official denunciation quickly aroused Congress to the promulgation of the regulation and stiff fines now await the unthinking flyer.

While the order was issued a month ago, the penalties do not go into effect until midnight tonight. It is provided that no flyer shall descend lower than three thousand feet within the D. C. boundaries, unless landing, taking off, or en route to another point; that all persons except United States Agents, such as army, navy, marine corps and mail fliers, must be duly licensed pilots; that no trick flying shall be attempted under any circumstances; and that aviators shall land only at designated fields.

Qualified pilots will be granted free licenses by the District Commissioners, and licenses issued by any lawfully created board of any state or by any branch of the federal government will be accepted in qualification. However, pilots passing over the District without descending into the safety zone will not be expected to have a license.

Police officials do not expect air traffic to become a very great problem for some time yet so they will rely upon the integrity of pilots to keep within the law. If any of them try to pull the wool over police eyes by fleeing after they break the law, eagle eyes will mark their descent and they will be nabbed anyway.

At least one such recalcitrant flyer who made a nuisance of himself as well as a possible danger, by flying low over the crowded ball park and throwing out advertising "fliers" has already fallen into police clutches, officers said. When he landed a cop was waiting him with a warrant for breaking the law in regard to cluttering public places with paper.

NEW WATER POWER PROJECTS INCREASE

WASHINGTON, July 21.—There is more water power development under way at the present time than at any previous period in the nation's history, the Federal Power Commission reported today in reviewing the results of its two years of administration under the Water Power Act.

Applications for water power developments filed with the commission since its creation have reached a total of 321 and involve approximately twenty million horse power, or more than twice the existing water power installation of the country. In the last year, after the first flood of applications had come in, they aggregated 5,000,000 horse power of proposed installation. Up to June 30 last, the report said, the commission had authorized a total of sixty preliminary, or survey, permits and forty nine licenses, eighteen of the latter for transmission lines, the permits involving an estimated installation of 2,386,000 horse-power and the thirty one licenses for

power projects 1,932,000 horse power.

Although it has been able to take final action on more than half of the applications for permits for licenses filed, the commission, the report said, has been forced to delay action on many important projects due to what was said to have proved to be a wholly inadequate personnel to handle the great amount of administrative de-
