## WOMEN WORKERS IN NEW YORK TO STRIKE

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—Seven local unions of the International Ladies' Garment Workers Union have voted to strike against a decrease in wages by the manufacturers. Officials of the union said the strike will affect 25,000 operatives.

LONDON, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—The national conference of the labor party heads has decided that unless the government accepts the proposals of labor on the unemployment situation, the question of direct action will be discussed and a decision reached on February 23.

## JAPS OPPOSED INVESTMENT U. S. CAPITAL

TOKIO, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—Newspapers here say the Japanese will protest the construction with American capital of a large wireless station at Shanghai, with Chinese branches, basing their claim on the ground that the work would interfere with concessions granted to Japan for wireless stations at points in the interior of China.

## TAILORS WANT CAPPER FABRIC BILL PASSED

CHICAGO, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—Speakers at the annual convention of the Merchant Tailors of America urged the support financially to the passage of the Capper truth-in-fabric bill now before congress, providing that manufacturers shall give the proportion of wool in all cloths manufactured.

## CAPTAIN ORDERED WOMEN WITH BABES TO JUMP OVERBOARD

MANILA, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—Women and babes in arms leaped overboard to perish on the rocks or drown on orders from the captain of the schooner wrecked in a fierce gale near here. An inquiry has been ordered into the conduct of the captain, who was among those saved.

## PARLIAMENTARY VOTE EXTENDED TO WOMEN

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—The house of parliament has sustained the constitutional amendment extending the parliamentary vote to both men and women, and making women eligible to office.

## NOT FEASIBLE TO STOP WORK GREATER NAVY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—Secretary of the Navy Daniels, discussing Senator Borah's resolution adopted by the senate asking whether it would be feasible to stop construction work on the six battleships being built for six months, said it would be a fatal mistake if the work was stopped for that period. He further said that any suggestion that the capital ships be abandoned in favor of submarines and aircrafts should be disregarded.

## ANTI-ALIEN LAND LAW FAVORED IN NEVADA

CARSON CITY, Nev., Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—The senate of the Nevada legislature has unanimously adopted a resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution providing that foreigners ineligible to become citizens can not hold agricultural, horticultural, grazing or mining property in the state.

## EVERETT HIGH COACH SIGNS ON WITH "U"

SEATTLE, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—Enoch Bagshaw, former star under Gil Dobie and for several years coach of the unbeaten Everett high school football team, has been selected by the University of Washington as football coach for three years, at a salary of \$4,500 a year.

## SYNDICALISM LAW IN WASHINGTON UPHELD

OLYMPIA, Jan. 28 (by Associated Press).—The supreme court in a decision rendered yesterday upholds the constitutionality of the syndicalism law, granting police powers to the state.
