JAMES K. VARDAMAN.

A Specimen of Vardaman's Traducers.

J. G. Bennett, who assisted, Fred Shillens to sling mud at J. K. Vardaman through the columns of the Jackson Evening News, has come to grief. He has been convicted of one of the blackest crimes in the catalogue-bigamy. The jury was out just five minutes and found the mud-slinger guilty. 
While the slush was flowing from the pen of this man Bennett, applauded and sanctioned, by the Secret Caucus crowd, Bennett was plotting on his heart to ruin the life and happiness of one of Mississippi's pure daughters. There is a climax in every career of crime, at which Providence intervenes the staying hand. He will permit the criminal to despoil so far, and then visit needs of punishment. He has done so with Bennett. Would that it had been done earlier. The point to this article is to hold Bennett up as a specimen of the traducers of Maj. Vardaman. He was of the heart, and talent to do the work which others could encourage to be done, but shrank from doing themselves. Sanction and execution of an ignoble deed are scarcely separated by lines of demarcation in the analysis of wrong. The abettor and the executor are moved by the same motives and are equally amenable at the bar of justice. For a job, such as Bennett was engaged to do, a mighty good price is generally exacted. Who paid the price is a pertinent question, and why should such unholy war be waged upon one man's character is another. Why should the reputation of James K. Vardaman be destroyed, if he was not in some ones way, and in whose way does the man stand? Is it because he is opposed to the encroachments of corporations, trusts and predatory wealth; or is it because he favors fair elections and the preservation of White Supremacy forever by revision of the Federal Constitution?

May the light of understanding enable the people to see the right of the questions in the pending election, and may they vote it for the preservation of truth and the good, not only of our grand old state, but the whole of Dixie.

NOT NEEDED.

It is currently whispered that attempts will be made to get Private John Allen to stump this county in the interest of the Percy Alexander ticket. Of course that is but a way to strengthen Percy Alexander, candidates for the State Senate and the lower house.

There might have been a time when Private John Allen, could have led the people of this county—that is when they believed him to be their friend, but since he has aligned himself with the candidates of the secret caucus, his speeches in that behalf, would be like a red flag flouted in a mad bull's face. "THE LINE UP."

Some of the Percy-Alexander supporters say they will not vote for a candidate who is known to be a Vardaman man, and yet these same fellows advocate that no "lining up" be done on the legislative ticket. They are so blinded by zeal for their own candidate that they have failed to discover that their own determination to vote for only Percy-Alexander candidates for the State Senate and the lower house in itself, is the emphatic "line-up." Else they take the Vardaman men to be a lot of fools, who will elect Vardaman in the primary, and make it impossible for him to be defeated in the legislature by electing to that body representatives who are his political enemies. It would be a most contradictory condition, indeed, for the people to instruct Percy or Alexander men to go to the legislature and elect Mr. Vardaman to the U. S. Senate. It would have been equally absurd for the United States government to have enlisted an army of Spaniards to have fought Uncle Sam's battles in the Spanish-American war. The secret caucus gang have all a

long accused the Vardaman supporters of being lowbrows, red-necks, cattle and hillbillies. Now they would put that estimate of them to the test by attempting to force them into voting for their abusers to fight their battles in the State legislature. All the Vardaman people may not be as astute as Private John Allen, who discovered that Dr. B. F. Ward has the brains of the Vardaman Army, but every Vardaman man has enough honest matter in his head to see through a slick little game of "line-up" like the one mentioned. In the every nature of things, if Mr. Percy or Mr. Alexander are elected at the polls, they will still have a legislature at their back who are now their advocates and friends. In the event Mr. Vardaman is elected it would be a coveted chance to haul fraud, fraud; and if his friends were not there to see justice done him, another secret caucus might be enacted and the people's choice again defeated by ways that are dark and paths that are devious. If you are for Vardaman, vote for his friends to carry out your instructions in the State legislature. If you are for Percy or Alexander, do not let friends behind him to pull a no secret caucus dodge and rob him of your preference. It is idle to say that nothing could be done. 
