Messrs. Jos. E. Saucier and W. T. Stocker having tendered their resignations, as members of the committee the same were accepted.

Moved and seconded that a convention be held at Nicholson, on Saturday, Aug. 25th, 1894, at 12 m., for the purpose of selecting delegates to the Congressional Convention, to be held at Pass Christian, Harrison county, Miss., September 4, 1894. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the delegates to the county convention be selected by the qualified Democratic electors of each precinct, who are registered before the 6th day of July, A. D. 1894, at the following places, to wit: Beat No. 1, Pearlinton; beat No. 2, Nicholson; beat No. 4, Kilo; beat No. 5, Bay St. Louis. Carried.

Moved and seconded, that the representation of each beat in the county convention shall be five delegates. Carried.

Drowned While Bathing

The following account of the sad death of Mr. R. A. Rolph is taken from the Coast News, of Pass Christian:

Mr. R. A. Rolph, a traveling auditor of the Standard Oil Co., was drowned out in front of the Mexican Gulf Hotel Sunday evening at six o'clock. Mr. Rolph and a friend named Bonnecastle came over to spend the day and in the evening decided to take a bath. They waded out quite far and before they knew it they were in the channel. The current was very strong and carried Rolph under. Mr. Bonnecastle succeeded in making noise enough to attract attention on shore and a boat started to the rescue immediately.

When the boat arrived the body of Mr. Rolph could not be seen anywhere, but they succeeded in catching Mr. Bonnecastle as he was going down the last time. Our citizens at once began searching for the body but it was not recovered until Monday evening, having washed ashore at Fort Henry. Mr. Rolph was a native of Louisville, Ky., and was only twenty-six years old. Several of his friends came over yesterday and took the body in charge as soon as it was found. They had it prepared for burial and shipped Tuesday to Louisville.
