The wool growers very generally share our opinion that a tariff law under which wool reaches the lowest price ever known is a failure and ought to be repealed, and that any change would be desirable. Many of them strongly favor putting wool on the free list as the best means of making a steady market for the Montana product at living prices, but not one of them, so far as we have learned, believes the McKinley law to be of any use to the wool grower, although there are those, of course, who believe in some degree of protection.

A number of papers published in the wool growing districts immediately jumped on the Independent's neck, the foremost among them being the Billings. foremost among them being the Indepen-dazette, which charged the Indepen-dent with being either a damphool or a The Indendent declined to join issue on either of these allegations, and intimated that if its original statement was wrong, the better way for the Gazette to do would be to disprove it, and though, according to all precedent, the burden of proof really lay with the Independent, the Ga-sette promptly accepted the task laid out for it, and indited a circular letter to the wool growers of the state, quoting the Independent's editorial assertion. and asking opinion as to the truth or falsity of it. The replies have commenced to come in, and the first grist is published in this week's Gazette, some of which we reprint below for the information of our people.
