The earliest book in which copp plate engravings were used as an adorament was issued in 1470.

The first printed books had their eaves printed on one side only, the blank sides being pasted together.

Many of the Chinese books are block books, each page being cut from a sin-gle block of wood, after the manner of an engraving.



The use of papyrus in the manufac-ture of books began as early as the fif-teenth century before the Christian era and was finally abandoned, even in Egypt, about the tenth century.


When types were first invented, they were made to testate the letters made by the copyists, and great pains were taken to cause the printed volumes to resemble the work of the monks.

### BOOKMAKING.

The first books printed from types faced with copper came from the press in 1850.

Stereotyping in the main, according to the present method, was invented in 779 by Tilloch.

In B. C. 407 the price of wooden ac-ount books for merchants' use was a trachma each, about 19 cents. A booksellers' trust was formed in London as early as 1829 for the purpose of crushing out the small book dealers.

The first printed and illustrated work on natural history was a "Herbarius," by Schoeffer, in 1484. It had wood cuts of 250 plants.

The word book comes to us from the Saxon boc, meaning beech, because the Saxons usually wrote either on beech boards or on bark.

When many copies of any book were required during the days of manuscript, all the scribes in a monastery were as-sembled and wrote from the dictation of a reader. Logographic printing, the most com-

mon words being cast in one piece, was attempted for books in 1783, but soon abandoned, not being so convenient as the single letters.

In Ireland and Scotland during the

seventh and eighth centuries the scribe, a book writer, was held in such esteem that the fine for killing him was as heavy as that for taking the life of a

cutenerg's Bibles were sold in Joose sheets, and each purchaser selected for himself the style and amount of hand illumination be wanted, the kind of binding and the fumber of chars and bosses he was willing to pay for.

The most ancient books extant are to earthenware tablets from Ninevell They are usually 9 inches by 6 and an inch thick, though the sizes vary great-ly. Each is covered with cuneiform characters, often very minute.—St. characters, often ver Louis Globe-Democrat.
