## SHOOTS HORSETHIEF

Deputy Morgan Kills Pileger on Swimming Woman--Wanted on Horse Stealing Charge.

Deputy Sheriff Al Morgan of Lewistown shot and killed Pileger, an alleged cattle and horse thief, on Swimming Woman north thief, on Monday morning. Pileger, who is wanted on several charges of horse stealing in this and Meagher counties, resisted arrest and Deputy Morgan was forced to resort to the use of his gun to secure his man or be injured bodily himself.

Pileger, it is believed, was the head of an organized band of rustlers who have been operating in Fergus, Meagher and Yellowstone counties, and a warrant for his arrest has been out for some time. The officers finally traced the leader to their headquarters about twelve miles northwest of Lavina where the shooting occurred when Deputy Morgan attempted to arrest him. It is expected that this will put a damper on the operations of the gang.
