HISTORY is a lot of little things. It is a broken wagon wheel beside a grass-grown trail. It is an abandoned homestead shack beside a lone cottonwood tree or a rusting pile of steel and tin in the coulee, the "Maxwell" nameplate long ago weathered away.

Here's the way to do it:

Just write out the story as you would tell it to your friends and send it to Montana Farmer-Stockman. 
The writer will also be presented a hand-somely engraved certificate suitable for framing or for use as a bookplate, declaring the

ing or for use as a bookplate, declaring the writer to be a member of the Montana Society of Historical Writers and listing the publication which carried his story and the date.

The rules are simple: The stories must be true accounts of events or incidents that happened in Montana or

They can be any length under 1,000 words.
They may be either typed or in longhand.
Selections by the editors must be considered final and manuscripts cannot be re-
