The violet smiled: "Keep faith and fidelity."


Whispered the grass blades: "May you and your children found a new tribe which will prosper, number in warriors as we, the grass."

More grim was the voice of the arrow: "I spare your lives, but you must go—go far away, because, I must uphold the laws and traditions of my tribe and people."


