First, he shall be a citizen of the United States; Second, he shall have resided in this State one year immediately preceding the election at which he offers to vote, and in the town, county or precinct such time as may be prescribed by law; provided, first, that no person convicted of felony shall have the right to vote unless he has been pardoned: Provicted of felony shall have the right vote unless he has been pardoned; Provided, second, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to deprive any person of the right to vote who has such right at the time of the adoption of this Constitution: Provided, that of this Constitution: Provided, that after the expiration of five years from the time of the adoption of this Constitution no person except citizens of the United States shall have the right
