#### chance for it. MEASURES OF RETRENCHMENT.

Senator Powning has begun a good work by the introduction of a bill to reduce the number of Legislative attaches and regulate their pay. There is no branch of the State service which is more in need of regulating than this, and any move in the direction of this much needed reform will be well received by the tax payers of Nevada. In many cases the offices are not given because of the competency of the recipient, but as a reward for some work in e campaign which merits anything but recognition. The bill reduces the salary of the Secretary of the Senate from \$10 to \$8 er day; that of the Assistant Secretary from \$10 to \$7; that of the Sergeant-at-Arms from \$10 to \$8, and the Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms from \$8 to \$5; that of the Minute and Journal Clerks from \$9 to 87. Engrossing and Enrolling Clerks are done away with. They are now paid \$9 per day. The various committees are empowered to have the writing done at 10 and 15 cents per folio. One copying clerkship is abolished in each House-a saving of \$18 per day-and the salary of those remaining reduced to \$6 per day. The salary of the Chief Committee Clerk is cut down from \$6 to \$5, and one Committee Clerk in each House dropped, and the salary of the rest reduced to S5. The Porter's pay is cut down from \$5 to \$4, and the Messengers' from \$4 to \$3. If this bill becomes a law, it will, at the next session, result in a saying of about \$7,400. This is certainly an

item of expense well worth saving, and

there is no doubt that the bill will be-

come a law.

#### THE ASYLUM JOB.

As has been usual in times gone by, the lobbyists of the Stockton Insane Asylum are in Carson endeavoring to secure the contract for the Stockton institution of caring for the insane of Nevada for another term. The money which has been paid Messrs. Langdon & Clark by the State would have erected a well proportioned asylum in which our insane could be cared for at home. There are many serious objections to the proposition of sending the insane of Nevada abroad. The parties having the treatment of the patients in charge are paid so much per diem for every person whom they treat. It is not in the in terest of their pockets to effect rapid cures, and the friends of the patients in Nevada cannot visit them at convenient intervals. There must be considerable profit in the contract which the managers of the Stockton asylum labor so assidiously each year to secure, and there is no reason why the State should not begin to save the heavy additional expense consequent upon sending patients to so remote a place as Stockton. The principal objection which has so far been raised against a home MERCHANTS, asylum is its cost. The plans submitted have been on a scale hardly compatable with the present state of the treasury, and this reason is constantly urged against any change. While the plan of erecting a \$400,000 building will not be favorably received by the tax payers, the erection of a suitable building at a reasonable cost will meet with general approval.
