FOREIGN NEWS.

FRANCE.—From Paris the news is that the number of Ministers in the Bureaux who favor amnesty is smaller than was anticipated.

A dispatch from Versailles dated 26th, says that in the Chamber of Deputies to day ten members were elected as a Committee on the Amnesty Question; of these, two favor complete amnesty, the remainder, belonging to the Left and Left Center, favor individual pardons.

The Paris dispatch says for her: Several Deputies intend to introduce a motion that the Chamber, confiding in the firmness and sentiments of elemency of the government, passes to the order of the day. The motion will in all probability be adopted.

The Left have resolved to strongly contest, and will probably invalidate several elections, especially those of Keller, Clericalist Deputy from Belfont; Count Demaine, Legitimist, who claimed a majority over Gambetta in Avignon; De La Rochejaquelain, Legitimist. According to reliable intelligence, it is certain that almost the entire Left have resolved to support the Ministry for some length of time. The recent attacks of the Republican journals were really not serious, being merely due to political tactics.

ITALY.—The Directo, the organ of the Left, says the programme of the Ministry is calculated to reassure Europe. The views of the Cabinet on many points resemble those of the French Ministry. Germany will find the Italian home policy aiding in vigorously pursuing the course which she has adopted. The Italian Cabinet will assume an energetic attitude on the ecclesiastical question. It will not change the foreign policy of Italy, but will pursue a more liberal home policy.

SPAIN.—The Spanish Government will send reinforcements of troops to the Philippine Islands in April and May.

Table of Rates of Domestic Postage.

The following are the rates of postage on Desertie Mail Matter of the different classes:

Note—All domestic mail matter (except newsapers, magazines and periodicals sent to actual

must be prepaid by postage stamps.

A letter on which one full rate of postage in prepaid, but on which further postage is charge-able, will be forwarded, when deposited is a post-office, charged with the unpaid postage to be collected on delivery. If the postage is left wholly unpaid, or is prepaid less than case falls rate, it will be held for postage and sent to the Dead Letter Office. Should it reach its destage. ion by inadvertence, however, it will be charged with double postage on delivery. "One faile rate" means, in the case of mail letters or other

first class matter, three cents.

The following articles are excluded from the mails: Liquids, Poisons, Glass, Explosive Ma-terials, Books, Pamphlets, Pictures and other publications of an obscene or indecent character; all letters upon the envelopes of which, and pos-tal cards upon which, sourrilous epithess are written or printed or engraved, or disloyal devices printed or engraved; and all articles which from their form or nature are liable to destroy, deface or injure the centents of mail bags or the person of any one engaged in the postal service, Postmasters are not allowed to give cradit for postage, nor to deliver any mail matter until all postage due thereon has been paid.

Norg. - Mailable matter of this class embraces all newspapers, magazines and periodicals ex-olusively in print and regularly issued at states periods from a known office of rablication, and addressed to regular subscribers.

PREPAYMENT.

Sec. 5. That on and after the 1st day of Janeary, 1875, on all newspapers and periodical publications mailed from a known office of publication or news agency, and addressed to regular subscribers or news-agents, postage shall be charged at the following rates: On newspapers and periodical publications, issued weekly and oftener, two cents a pound and fraction thereof: less frequently three cents a pound and fraction thereof: Provided, That nothing in this act shall be held to change or average. be held to change or amend section 99 of the set entitled, "An act to revise, consolidate, and amend the statutes relating to the Post-Office

Department," approved June 8th, 1872. Sec. 6. That on and after the 1st day of January ary, 1875, upon the receipt of such newspapers and periodical publications at the office of mailing, they shall be weighed in bulk, and postage paid thereon by a special adhesive stamp, to be devised and furnished by the Postmaster Gen-eral, which shall be affixed to such matter, or to the sack containing the same, or upon a m randum of such mailing, or otherwise, as the Postmaster General may, from time to time, provide by regulation.
