CONGRESSMAN PUJO.

Mr. William E. Krebs, Campaign manager for Congressman Pujol, says:

"The eve of the primary election, according to disinterested political observers, finds Congressman Arsené P. Pujol in a commanding position, so far as the race for the Senatorial term beginning March 4, 1915, is concerned. Mr. Pujol's record of ten years' good service for his District in Congress assures him of a large majority from his Congressional District in the State. His frank and open stand for Judge Hall ever since the latter's nomination last June, it is conceded, assures him of the support of almost the entire membership of the Good Government League, city and country. In New Orleans, the ward presidents of that organization are, almost without exception, for him and he will receive ninety per cent. of the vote cast for Judge Hall. In addition to these elements of political strength, Mr. Pujol will receive the votes of thousands of business and professional men, not actively engaged in politics, who will support him for his undoubted, overshadowing ability and fitness to fill the position worthily and creditably. Unlike other candidates, Mr. Pujol's advocates make no loud claims, but he will come as near winning in the first primary as any of his opponents, and is certain of winning in the second primary, no matter who his opponent may be."

I shall use my every effort to further the Good road cause, now so well under way, and this I pledge myself to do.

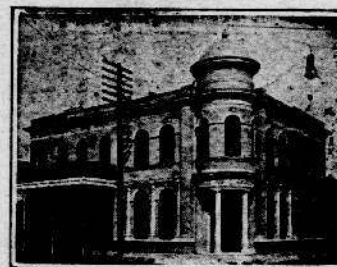
