

Proceedings of the Board of School Directors of the Parish of St. John the Baptist EDGARD, LOUISIANA

JULY 6th, 1916.
On this day the Board of School Directors of the Parish of St. John the Baptist met in regular session with the following members present: Messrs. Abadie, Alexander, Waddell, and Leger. Moved by Mr. Alexandre seconded by Mr. Leger, the minutes of the preceding meeting, were approved as read. Mr. Alexandre, moved that a resolution be adopted by the Board creating a one room school in the lower part of the fourth ward Mr. Alexandre advanced as his motive the large number of children who do not attend the Ory school due to the fact that the transfer must leave at such an early hour. Mr. Waddell, seconded by Mr. Leger, offered as a substitute motion that owing to the serious shortage of funds which confronts this Board the matter be laid on the table to be considered at the next regular meeting. Messrs. Abadie, Leger and Waddell voted in favor of this motion while Mr. Alexandre opposed it. The motion to table was carried.

The superintendent recommended for appointment the following teachers: Godchaux School: F. D. Gesserand; principal. F. L. Laurent assistant principal, Nettie McHugh, Carrie Maus, M. Wolfe, B. Born, one to be supplied. Edgard School, J. O. Montegut, principal C. B. McClung, Asst Principal, (English & History teacher to be supplied) M. Henry, F. Knobloch, M. Aycock, F. Laurept. Garyville School, A. Scallan principal A. Gilmore, Jennie Perrin, M. Sterling I. Lawes, M. Fort. Lions School, J. J. Hudnall principal. E. Bienvenue. MT. Airy, B. Aycock, principal, A. Maurin.

Jno L. Ory, R. Brown principal, Ida Ory, Ora Hyams, L. Hearns. Berthelot School, W. S. Frazee, principal, M. Maubert, one to be supplied. Evergreen School, R. Abadie, M. Fitzpatrick. Wallace School, T. A. Phillips, principal, L. Fauver. On motion duly seconded, the above list was approved and teachers therein enumerated appointed to respective schools named.

Mr. Leger, seconded by Mr. Waddell that official printing of Board be awarded to Meschaebe at the same cost of \$150.00. Those voting in favor of the motion being Messrs. Abadie, Waddell and Leger. Against Mr. Alexandre and the motion was carried. Mr. Alexandre offered a resolution that provided for the repeal of the previous resolution and granting the printing to lowest bidder. There was no second to Mr. Alexandre's motion. On Motion of Mr. Leger, seconded by Mr. Waddell and carried, the following was adopted as a temporary budget, subject to revision in case of additional revenues.

UN TORNADO

Dégats considerable a Carrollton

Maisons demolies; cottages endommages; Plusieurs personnes blessées.

Le violent orage qui s'est abattu la semaine dernière dans le haut de la ville à Carrollton, a causé des dégâts plus sérieux qu'on avait tout d'abord supposé. Voici la liste des dommages:

La résidence de M. Louis Rush, 34 Place Néron, dommages au toit, \$50; au cottage du Dr. T. Crebbin, 38 Place Néron, \$15; à l'épicerie de Keller Berg, Place Néron, \$35, au hangar à l'arrière, \$50, la bâtisse appartient à M. Kenner, 2137 Fern.

A la maison de George Hodgden, 39 Place Néron, \$20; au cottage de H. J. Jensen, 40 Néron \$50; à la maison de John D. Nix au coin avenue Carrollton et Spruce, en voie de construction, partiellement démolie, causant des dégâts de \$2,000 au hangar de la New Orleans Railway and Light Company, avenue Carrollton, dommages au toit, \$100; au cottage 926 Cambronne, appartenant à G. Gorrojjolles, \$3,000; à la bâtisse 912 Cambronne, appartenant à O. G. Cividon, \$159; à la maison 1905 avenue Carrollton appartenant à F. Marrero, \$300.

La toiture de la Seventh District Ice Company, partiellement démolie, pertes \$500, et une partie de la bâtisse endommagée; au cottage double 1335 1337 Dublin propriétaire inconnu, \$20.

Le garage évalué à \$225, appartenant à L. C. Root, 7610 rue Nelson, au coin de la rue Adam a été démolie et jeté par la violence du vent de l'autre côté du canal Calabonne, une distance d'un let. Les dommages au toit de la maison de M. Nelson, se montent, à \$200.

Edward Collier, 21 ans, 5252 Laurel., et Peter Sprague, 20 ans 712 Toulouse réparaient le toit d'une maison au coin Spruce et Cambrone, lorsqu'ils furent renversés par une rafale et tombèrent à terre d'une hauteur de 30 pieds. Collier reçut des contusions au bras, et Sprague ne fut que légèrement étourdi.

Un jeune enfant, Horace Perez, 4 ans, jouant dans la cour de ses parents, au No. 1238 rue Dante, a été blessé à la tête par une ardoise emportée par le vent. Alcée Gebhart, 7 ans, 8421 rue Burthe, a été emporté par une rafale et jeté avec force contre un wagon de marchandises au coin Joliet et Burthe. Gebhart a été contusionné au bras droit, et blessé à la figure. Il est soigné à sa demeure.
