

## BIG REAL ESTATE DEALER DEAD

John G. Wendell Next to Astor in Property Holdings  
New York, Dec. 1.—With the possible exception of the Astor estate, John G. Wendell, who died yesterday in Los Angeles, was reputed to own more real estate on Broadway than any other person and his property holdings in the city are said to have been greater than those of any other individual. Wendell inherited the property.

The Wendell fortune, estimated at upwards of \$50,000,000 accrued from investments in New York real estate and it was one of Wendell's policies never to sell any land. Another of Wendell's characteristics was that no hotel or amusement place of any kind was allowed to exist on his property. "Call it sentiment, if you like," he is reported to have said. "Perhaps it is, but I want to keep the little buildings as they were when they came to me. There are also moral and legal reasons. In the first place, I will not be responsible for the machinations of the evil one. I have plenty to do without being responsible for immoral souls." A vacant lot, next to Wendell's brownstone house at Fifth avenue and Thirty-ninth street, he always refused to sell or build upon. "My dog must have a place to romp," he explained. This home and lot have been valued at \$300,000.

## WILL REBUILD TOWN

Fire at Marienville Destroys Forest County's Only Licensed Place

Tionesta, Pa., Dec. 1.—The town of Marienville, which was almost destroyed Sunday by fire is to be rebuilt, stated S. G. Mensch, a prominent business man of that town. Work of rebuilding the business section will be started as soon as possible. A large number of neighboring towns sent supplies to the stricken town yesterday. A grocery store, meat market and clothing store has been opened in temporary quarters, which will supply the necessities and destitute. Hundreds of people visited the town Sunday night and yesterday and the sight presented was a pitiable one. A large number of people stood around homeless and disheartened. Many lost all their belongings and have no insurance.

When it was realized that the Keystone Hotel was doomed its furnishings and liquors were removed. Opponents of liquor bored holes in the barrels of whiskey as they stood on the street, but were stopped after three barrels had been punctured. The hotel was the only one in the county with a license and the fire has now made Forest an all-dry county.

## LOVER TRIES TO KILL GIRL

Fights Desperately With Sweetheart and Her Mother  
Lancaster, Pa., Dec. 1.—Rodney Hart, 22 years old, yesterday morning called at the home of Mrs. William Ankamp and told her that unless her daughter agreed to marry him before 12 o'clock he would shoot her.

The mother hastened to the downtown office where the daughter is employed, to tell her, and a moment after she reached the office young Hart entered and asked the girl to marry him. She did not answer and as he tried to carry out his threat Mrs. Ankamp took a hand and tackled the young man. After a struggle of a few minutes she wrenched the revolver from his hand, and the daughter screamed for aid. Her cries brought a dozen men from adjoining offices and it was with difficulty that they took the young man away.

Hart then had the young woman on the floor, was choking her and had severely bitten her hand. Hart was arrested.

## FREDDIE WELSH FEARS SHUGRUE'S LUCKY PUNCH

Lightweight Champion Says He Has Hardest Part of Bargain in Tomorrow's Bout With Jerseyite—Sam McVey Returns

New York, Dec. 1.—Freddie Welsh, lightweight champion of the world, announced last night that he has reached the weight limit, 135 pounds, at which he is to fight Joe Shugrue, of Jersey City, at Madison Square Garden to-morrow night. For the first time in his pugilistic career Welsh has expressed his respect for his prospective opponent's punch.

"It's not the weight that's worrying me half so much as it is this fellow Shugrue's wallop," said Freddie. "You know, although I am expected to win, I'm the guy that has the hardest part of the proposition in confronting him on Wednesday night. This young man Shugrue has everything to gain and not a thing to lose, and therefore he'll waste in and take all sorts of chances—and, you know, even a world's champion is liable to be the victim of a lucky punch."

"Don't misunderstand me. I'm not paying the way for any 'alibi.' I'm merely calling attention to the fact that my task will be much harder than my opponent's. I'll have to go in there and keep a weather eye out for the wild swing, in addition to putting over a little of my own speciality in the way of fiststuffs. Do I make myself perfectly clear?"

According to Shugrue's reported utterances on the subject, the champion, to use the vernacular, has the right dope. The little Jerseyite declares that he intends to put all his dependence in one wallop, and if that one fails, to persevere with other wallops. Joe is thoroughly imbued with the idea that Welsh cannot hurt him with his punches, and evidently intends to sail in from the start in an endeavor to score decisively with a telling blow. Shugrue weighed 134 pounds last night.

The return of Sam McVey, the heavyweight, from the war zone has proved a blessing to such battlers as Battling Jim Johnson, Joe Jeannette and Sam Langford, who have experienced a dearth of employment, due to the fact that they have been unable to secure opponents. Langford, Jeannette and Johnson have fought one another so often that their battles have lost interest, and a new factor will unquestionably be welcomed by them. Battling Jim Johnson is the first to take on the newcomer, and the pair will meet at the Fairmont A. C. on Thursday, December 10.

## BRICKLEY WOULD COACH

Harvard Captain in Need of Funds  
Seeks Place As Football Adviser

Cambridge, Dec. 1.—Captain Brickley, of Harvard's champion football team is out for a berth as football coach in some college in or near New York, in which city he plans to start in business after his graduation in June.

"It is my present plan and hope to coach next fall, but not at Harvard," said Brickley yesterday.

"I intend to work in New York after graduation. It would be preferable, then, to coach a team within reasonable distance of that city. It is my idea that it would be foolish to accept a one-year contract as a football coach. In one year I could not do justice to myself nor to the team I coached. It would not be fair for any of the parties concerned to attempt to build up a winning combination in one year."

"Harvard and Haughton would have little use for me next fall. And I need the money. Several propositions have been made to me indirectly, but I have done nothing definitely. Things being equal, I would pass up an offer to coach a Western team and accept a position as coach of an eastern team. I consider that my value as a coach would come from my long connection with the Haughton system of football as taught at Harvard, not from any individual ability as a player."

Brickley, in case of securing a coachship, said he would like the assistance of some ex-Harvard line men in developing the team.

## FOLWELL TO REMAIN

Former U. of P. Star Will Again Coach Washington and Jefferson  
Washington, Pa., Dec. 1.—Robert C. Folwell, former Pennsylvania star, has signed a contract to again coach the football team at Washington and Jefferson College in 1915.

This announcement was made yesterday by Graduate Manager R. M. Murphy, who secured Folwell's signature to the necessary paper following the Rutgers game in New York Saturday. Next year will be Folwell's fourth at Washington and Jefferson. During the three years his teams have won three sectional championships by defeating Pittsburgh University three successive times, have once beaten and once tied Yale; twice the Carlisle Indians in the only game played, once defeated Penn State, as well as winning from all sectional rivals. During this time only three games have been lost, one each to Yale, Harvard and Penn State.
