COURT.—The session of Court yesterday morning was occupied in hearing motions &c. The following divorce cases were considered:

Mary Rhebine vs. Henry L. Rhebine. Referred to L. Elsbree, Commissioner.

Margaret Wells, vs. Melvin Wells. Sheriff directed to make proclamation.

E. T. Fox vs. David Benjamin and M. Kirwin terre tenant. On motion of W. Foyle Court grant rule to show cause why judgment should not be stricken off, returnable to argument Court.

At the opening of the session in the afternoon, Mr. M'Pherson moved for arrest of judgment in the case of Com. vs. Abrams, convicted last week of fornication and bastardy.

Eight prisoners convicted last week, were

brought in by the sheriff and received sentences. The Judge in sentencing them administered some wholesome advice.

John Doyle, for stealing a pair of mittens, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$5, costs and imprisonment in the county jail ten days.

Adam Fogarty, a 13 years old lad, convicted of larceny, was committed to the House of Refuge.

Walter and Alonzo Pool were sent to the Eastern Penitentiary for a term of two years and 11 months, and Sam Pool one year and 11 months for stealing "Dr." Corr's "medicine chest."

B. F. and John B. Ball, convicted of aggravated assault, were given two years and 11 months, solitary confinement in the Penitentiary, in addition to a fine of \$100 and costs of prosecution. Sentence on another indictment was suspended, with an intimation by the court that unless their conduct is more circumspect after their release he will have them brought before him for sentence.

Frank Warner and Henry Wheeler, who plead guilty to assaulting and robbing young Brinnan near Hemlock Run last August, were sentenced to pay a fine of \$250 each, the costs of prosecution and undergo imprisonment in the Eastern Penitentiary for the term of 8 years and 11 months.
