Justice Fisher's court room was crowd? ed this morning when the case of Dr. S. Clay Todd, who was sued for damages by Mrs. Francis Eade, came up for trial, Attorney W. J. McDonald appeared for the plaintiff and Attorney O. J. Larson was for the defendant. It took from 10 o'clock this morning until 2 this afternoon to settle the case. There was a good deal of trouble in securing a jury agreeable to both sides, but the following gentlemen were finally secured: J. H. Joslin, Joseph Wilmers, J. H. Johnson, Joseph Murphy, James Lang and James Hocking.

Only two witnesses were examined, the plaintiff and defendant, in the case. The testimony long drawn out and most of the time was spent by the attorneys in arguing points of law in regard to the case. Mrs. Eade claimed that the doctor agreed to cure her in a month, that she was not any better at the end of the time than when she began the treatment and wanted damages to the amount of \$100 for her trouble, etc. The jury was not | Hardware Co.


