Our Boston Letter.

Boston, Mass., April 11, 1898. Another week of suspense was experlenced during the past seven days and the prospects of war are just as threatening, although the prospects of peace are equally as bright as a week ago. According to the latest cables from Madrid, the willingness of Spain to accede to our demands makes it probable that a conflict may be avoided, although the concessioa may not be directly in response to President McKinley's ultimatum, For ostance, the Spanish cabinet last week stribbornly refused to make any further concessions or to change its attitude at the request of our minister, General Woodford, but later, on the advice of the Pope, granted an armistice in Cuba as previously was demanded by the United States. It matters little to the United States whether Spain finally grants independence to Cuba at our request or at the bidding of the Pope, Queen Victoria or the concert of the European powers, so long as we gain our point and can achieve the object for which we are striving without resort to force. If there is any honor to be gained or any balm for wounded Spanish pride in doing at the suggestion of others that which Spain refuses to do at the request of the United States, no one will deny Spain that much empty honor and vain

The stock market the past week made no demonstration either one way or the other. As the public is out of the market the bear traders could not induce Equidation of long accounts and, as prices did not break, no new buyers came in. It was a dull listless affair and satudy of the fluctuations from day to day would not impress anyone with the idea that any important event was pending or that the situation was critical in any respect. Outwardly it was nothing more nor less than a very quiet market with even the professional operators disinclined to trade on either side. It may have been the calm before the storm, but leading brokers do not anticipate a severe flurry even should war be declared as it has been pretty thoroughly discounted already and would surprise no body. It is a fact, however, that many capitalists are now waiting for a stock market panic so as to buy stocks at a bargain and this element would exert quite an influence upon prices should the speculative room traders mark prices down very materially on short selling.

The gold imports now have a total of more than \$54,000,000, but that fact hes no influence in stock market circles at present. Although the war scare was what started the gold coming this way a such large amounts, it does not miti. Apply at 350 Fifth street

gate the adverse influence exerted by the war scare. It has assisted very materi-ally, however, in preventing a stringent money market which would have made it bad for owners of hypothecated securities. A great deal of money has been withdrawn from the banks recently and sent to safe deposit vaults in interior cities, capitalists fearing to leave it within reach of the enemy in case of an attack upon the seacoast, and the loss of this currency under any other circumstances would have sent loaning rates up to high figures. The gold imports offset this loss and the New York associated banks today have a larger surplus on hand than at the be ginning of the trouble.

There is little that is new to be said of quotations for the metal and the outlook | in the finest qualities. is highly satisfactory. Some of the largest producers are out of the market, being sold ahead as far as they care to be at current prices, and the smaller mining companies are showing no disposition to cut prices. In fact they have little reason to make concessions so long as consumers are bidding recent maximum figures for delivery after the opening of naviga-

The Boston & Montana company has been incorporated in the state of New York for reasons which have not been made public, but on the advice of the counsel for the company. It is noteworthy that the Butte & Boston company was reorganized under the corporation laws of the same state and the old rumors of a future consolidation of these two companies are strengthened thereby.


