## Mining News

### PAINE, WEBBER & CO.'S GOSSIP.

The yearly earnings of the Anaconda Copper Co. for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1909, total net income available for dividends \$2,134,773; increase, \$1,051,793; dividends, \$2,400,000 unchanged. Deficit, \$2,665,227; decrease, \$1,051,792. Production for year-copper, 75,860,154 pounds, an increase of 10,991,618; silver, 2,363,184 ounces; gold, 7,466 ounces.

President R. C. Pryor, of the Lake Copper company says:

"The so-called episode or secondary lode in the Lake property has never been mined separately. The limited operations on this lode and the necessity of keeping the openings on the main lode going, taken in connection with the fact that we have no storage in the rock house, make it very impracticable to have a separate test just at present, also a test from the limited openings on this lode would not be a fair one to the lode. I do not think the rock sent to the mill from this lode has had any appreciable effect upon the mill returns."

New York. One of the most prominent financiers in Wall Street, a man who is a director in 25 railroads, industrial companies, banks and trust companies, whose advice is given weighty consideration at directors' meetings and who keeps in detailed touch with all economic phases of our country's industrial life, believes that events are shaping themselves for another halt in the industrial program. He does not by any means foresee another panic, but believes that an economic re-adjustment is pending in which the current high prices for commodities and high scale of wages will come down materially, this re-adjustment being the inevitable result of a closing down of business which present conditions, he thinks, will force upon the country before long. His argument is that the last ten years or more this country has seen wonderful industrial development, induced by the prosperity and extravagance of our people. To meet the increasing demand for products, industrial corporations have spent millions to enlarge the capacity of their plants, which have now reached a maximum production development. In the meantime various economic conditions have forced an advance in the price of practically all commodities and high prices have forced higher wages. This condition would simply mean an equal exchange of labor for commodities on a higher scale than before if our trade were confined to our markets alone but Europe is our competitor. Wages there are lower than ours and commodities cheaper. So long as prices continue high in this country we shall continue to export gold.

In time this drain on our resources with the continued decline in foreign demand for our goods will naturally check business, tighten money and force economy.

### MINNEAR & CO'S GOSSIP.

In April The Nevada Consolidated treated 215,000 tons of ore averaging 1.59 per cent copper. Extraction at the concentrator was 71.84 per cent. There was shipped 5,213,522 pounds of copper. Production figures for the month which will exceed these, are not as yet available.

The Boston Stock Exchange has vot-

ed not to open the Exchange on Friday May 20 until 12 o'clock noon in honor of King Edward's memory.

The Anaconda's Neverwear mine which was out of commission for a few days, resumed yesterday.

### GAY & STURGIS GOSSIP.

Calumet, Mich., May 19.—The general market today was again very dull. Prices, however, remained firm and showed advances for the day at the close.

The Boston market was also very dull but prices were inclined to be a little higher.

Isle Royale was again the feature, opening at 22 1/2 and advancing to 24 with a slight recession near the close.

Calumet & Arizona directors declared regular quarterly dividend of \$1 per share after the close yesterday. This, however, had no effect on the price of the stock.

Houghton, May 19.—Surface trenching on Royale is again progressing after a day's suspension, due to heavy rain. Several local mining men have visited the trench on which Royale at last succeeded in uncovering what promises to be the richest lode yet opened in this property and all are unanimous in the opinion that the find is part of Baltic. Capt. W. A. Dunn, who first opened this lode on the Baltic property to the southward, is very encouraged over the Royale showing and says that with the exception of Lake's discovery which he did not see, the new find is the richest disclosure of copper ground since the discovery of Baltic and Champion mines, not even excepting Superior. Several large chunks of copper, one piece probably float copper and weighing about 250 pounds, have been taken from the trench, with smaller pieces ranging from the size of the thumb to the size of a fone's hands.—News Bureau.
