CALUMET Y. M. C. A. WILL BOOST ITS MEMBERSHIP

Preparations are being made for a monster two week's membership campaign to be conducted under the auspices of the Calumet Y. M. C. A. commencing next Monday. "300 Members by January 31" is the slogan under which the campaign will be conducted and every influence will be brought to bear to secure that number. ANNUAL MEETING OF R. J. CHURCH

RED JACKET CONGREGATIONAL CLOSING YEAR WITH BALANCE IN TREASURY — OFFICERS NAMED.

The members of the Red Jacket Congregational church held their annual meeting last evening in the auditorium of the church. Officers for the ensuing year were elected, and annual reports presented by the clerk, treasurer, trustees, Sunday school superintendent, secretary and treasurer, the Woman's Industrial society, and the Woman's Missionary society. All of the reports were considered very satisfactory, showing the church to be in a flourishing condition.

Clerk William Craig reported that the membership has increased twenty-nine during the past year, forty-one new members being enrolled. Three of the members died last year and nine removed by letter.

Treasurer Gribble's report showed that the past year was a much more prosperous one than the year 1909. At the end of the past year there was in the church's treasury, a total of \$141.27, which, with \$44 collected on 1910 pledges since Jan. 1, makes a total of \$185.27, with all bills paid.

Julius Ziegler, secretary and treasurer of the Sunday-school reported that there had been a total attendance in the primary department of 2,732, or an average of 52 each Sunday throughout the year. In the intermediate department there was a total attendance during the year of 4,496, averaging 88 per Sunday. The total attendance was 7,228, an average of 129 for the school for each Sunday. At the end of the year the school had \$54.14 on hand.

Miss Fannie Osborne, read the annual report of the Woman's Industrial society, showing that the society started last year with \$107.67 on hand. During the past year the society purchased a piano for the church, paid for re-wiring the building, and also paid the fuel bills. It closed the year with a cash balance of \$90.22. This was considered a most flattering report, and showed the excellent work accomplished by the members.
