ACCEPT LARGER PACKAGES NOW

New Parcel Post Plan Adopted by Government in Effect

Today the new parcel post regulations, whereby the weight limit of parcels mailed for delivery within the first and second zones is increased from 11 to 20 pounds and rates are reduced materially went into effect.

Under this arrangement it will be possible to mail a parcel weighing one pound or less anywhere within the city for five cents and a 20-pound package for 15 cents.

A very simple manner in which the postage required on a package for delivery outside the city limits in either the first or second zones may be determined is to allow one cent for each pound and add four cents working out in each instance.

Fresh fruits, fruits and other perishable articles, when inclosed and wrapped securely, will be accepted for mailing to follow within the first and second zones when the new regulations become effective.
