Lubbock and Lubbock county needs a packing-house. It would make a home market for our surplus cattle, hogs, sheep, poultry and other stuff handled by packers, and it would stimulate and increase such production. It would be a great saving in transportation, shipping out the live stock and shipping back the prepared products. It would keep the money in circulation here at home instead of sending it away. It would give employment to several of Lubbock citizens; it would be a great help and a great boost for Lubbock and the South Plains; it certainly would pay the stock men of the South Plains to put in a packing house at Lubbock.

We need a cheese factory for the same reasons, enumerated above.

We need a broom factory to work up here at home the great crops of broom corn that this great Lubbock country is capable of producing if we had a home market for it; and it would stimulate and increase our agriculture and be a great help in the way of diversification; and have other above reasons apply also.

We need a peanut factory to work up the immense peanut crops that

could be raised in this South Plains country, and that would add another great industry and help out diversification.

We need a canning factory to take care of fruits, vegetables and other stuff suitable for canning, and to make a market for the greatly increased crops of such that we could raise if we had sufficient market for it. There are several other industries that Lubbock and the South Plains needs and there is much more to say on the five here mentioned, but this is sufficient to present to your minds the great advantages and great possibilities to be derived from the establishment of said industrial plants in our midst.

BUCKNER'S ORPHAN HOME IS PLEDGED \$22,000

More than \$22,000 was given to Buckner Orphan's Home by representatives of the Texas Baptist Women's Missionary Union at the Buckner Orphan's Home evening of the annual convention, which was held at Central Christian Church Monday. In addition to this amount a carload of fruit and vegetables in one lot and numerous gifts of vegetables, chickens, newly made garments, 150 pounds of home-made candy and other goods were pledged.

The presentation of the gifts followed an address by Dr. Hal E. Buckner, son of the founder of the home and at present pastor of the church there. He told of the needs in food, clothing and housing facilities. Dr. Buckner declared that food for the home costs \$300 a day and the other expenses will total \$15,000 a month. Approximately \$198,000 a year is needed to properly feed the children, not considering the cost of repairs and maintenance of the buildings and grounds.



Texas Chamber of Commerce. This will be about sixty days earlier than the gins have ever closed before, since cotton has been a crop in the county.

Estimates for this year's cotton crop were set at 1500 bales when the season opened, did not miss the mark very much. The total ginnings to November 22nd, were 1362 bales. The unusually good season for maturing cotton this year has held the grade up greatly and over three-fourths of the crop has been middling. The value of the crop marketed locally has been in the neighborhood of \$150,000.

A. A. Garner was here Wednesday and called in to renew his subscription to the Avalanche. He made a good row crop this year, and gathered five bales from twelve acres of cotton.
