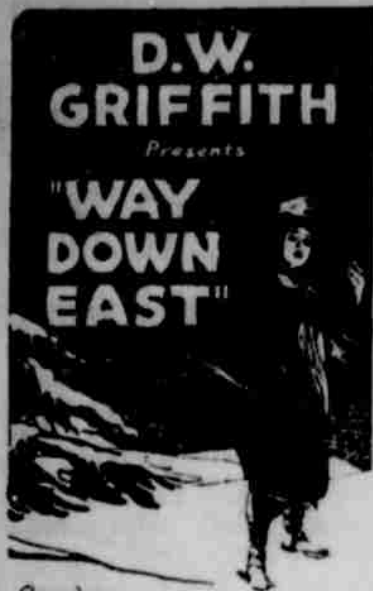

"Be Kind To Animals Week" April 24 to 29th

How often has been heard, "Don't feed the cat too much for she won't catch the mice." Now comes the Humane society and says: "A starved cat does not make a good mouser. Feed your cat well and give it fresh water often." It may be inferred that the cat does not catch the mice so much for food as for sport and exercise. If fed well, the cat probably does not crave mouse meat, but the instinct of the chase gains strength on a full stomach.

The eighth annual observance of "Be Kind to Animals" Week and Humane Sunday, will be April 24 to 29, with Humane Sunday on April 30th. It was started modestly in the United States seven years ago, and has become an event of national importance, attracting the attention of governors and even the President of the United States.

"Be kind to dumb animals." It is taught in the public schools, and surely the lessons are bearing fruit. It availed nothing to the youth of the land to bait dogs and roosters to fight; rather it tended to brutalize them and lead them to be cruel to other animals, then to be cruel to the home folks and finally to treat the neighbors cruelly—unless afraid of them. On the other hand, being taught to be kind to dumb animals, they have come to care less to see animals fight, they have become kinder to their kin and their comrades. It is a forward step in the development of the world along lines of better ideas on a higher plane.

It has been suggested by "Our Dumb Animals" that at noon on Monday, April 24, for five minutes following the stroke of twelve, that thoughtful consideration be given to the duty man owes his animal friends. It is a happy suggestion, can embarrass none and may be indulged profitably by many. Man is inclined to think the dumb animals owe everything they have to him and to forget how much they owe to the dumb animals. It is well to reflect upon man's debt to all the animals, domestic and wild; it should add to his humanity.

Looking backward through the pages of history and comparing the present with the past, it appears as though man have grown kinder to dumb animals and to each other. Kindness, sympathy, charity and love are linked closely together and are virtues man does well to cling to.

Income Tax Expert Makes Some Timely Suggestions To Taxpayers In Preparing The Accounts For 1922

The time for filing individual income tax returns for the calendar year 1921 has just passed, and no doubt most of us will give little thought again until the time comes when we will have to file our returns for 1922.

The purpose of this article is to impress on the minds of taxpayers the importance of their taxable incomes and allowable expenses for the year.

Often tax payers would be frightened to deduct from their gross income amounts spent during the year for certain items, but they have no records of the amount of the item and hesitate to claim the deduction for fear they may be called upon to substantiate the amount claimed.

This, of course, could not be done without some record of the transaction, if some simple record were kept, the item would be conscientiously claimed and result in a saving of tax to the taxpayer.

Another great advantage where records are kept is that the task of making up the return is simplified and results in a saving of time to yourself and the person assisting you.

It is also important to the taxpayer that his items of income are clearly analyzed, as certain kinds of income are entirely exempt from the tax, some are subject to both normal and surtax, and others are only subject to the surtax.

Following are a few suggestions as to items of which records should be kept:

SALARY—A record should be kept of the amount received from each source.

Interest on Bank Deposits, Notes, Mortgages and Corporation Bonds—As certain corporation bonds contain a tax-free covenant clause and a portion of the normal tax is assumed by the debtor corporation, the amount of this interest should be kept separate, as you are allowed as a credit the amount of tax paid for you by the corporation.

Interest on municipal bonds is exempt from the tax and need not be reported. Interest on Liberty and Victory Bonds is entirely exempt from the normal tax, but in certain cases is subject to the surtax and therefore a record should be kept of the amount of interest received from each issue.

Rents and Royalties—If you own renting property, a record should be kept of the amount of rent received, the amount expended for repairs and other expenses.

Business or Profession—Your records should show the total receipts from the business and a well-itemized list of the business expenses.

Sale of Real Estate—If you sell real estate during the year, note the year in which it was acquired, cost price, March 1, 1913, value, if acquired prior to that date, cost of subsequent improvements, amount of depreciation claimed in former years and the sale price.

Sale of Stocks and Bonds—If you sell stocks or bonds during the year, note the year acquired, cost price, March 1, 1913, value, if acquired prior to that date, and the sale price.

Dividends—If you receive dividends on stocks of domestic corporations, the amount should be kept separate as they are not subject to the normal tax; and if your net income including dividends does not exceed \$5,000 they do not enter into your computation.

Interest Paid—With a very few exceptions all interest paid is an allowable deduction, and therefore a careful record of the amounts paid should be kept.

Taxes Paid—All taxes, with a few exceptions are allowable deductions and a record of the kinds and amounts should be kept. One item of taxes which very few people keep any record of, is the luxury tax; this is an allowable deduction; and no doubt if you would jot down the dates and amounts as you pay them, you would be very much surprised at the end of the year to see how they had accumulated.

Contributions—Gifts to organized charitable, religious and educational institutions are allowable deductions and a record should be kept of the names of institutions

with the amounts given to each.

Losses—If you suffered any loss during the year from fire, storm, theft, etc., make a note of cost on March 1, 1913, value, depreciation previously claimed, salvage value and insurance received.

It is not necessary that the average individual keep a set of double entry books, but some simple form of receipt should be kept. Even a vest-pocket memorandum will do.

NO WET GAINS MADE DRY FORCES ASSERT

Washington, April 17.—Denial that the congressional elections and primaries to date have shown any "victories" for the wet forces, was made in a statement issued yesterday by the Anti-Saloon League.

In the Maine election in March, both Republican and Democratic candidates stood for prohibition and its enforcement, the statement declared and the New York election in the 37th District "showing no reaction for beer."

Referring to the primaries in Illinois, it was asserted that "Congressman Ireland was defeated by a former distiller who claimed that prohibition was an issue in the campaign," but the League statement added that with Peoria, "formerly the greatest distilling center in the United States, in the district, the result is not alarming."

The opponent of Congressman Copley has a dry record and the residents of his district recognized him as a friend of prohibition enforcement.

"The dries of the state made a vigorous fight for the nomination of Congressman-at-Large Rathbone," the analysis by the League continues. "This was a gain which offset the defeat of Mr. Ireland, in one other district, a friend of prohibition enforcement was nominated where the dries have had only partial support in Congress. The results show no loss but a slight gain in Illinois."
