**THE SITUATION AS
TO YELLOW FEVER.**

The Serious Condition in Mississippi is Unchanged, and in Louisiana It is Very Little Better.

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 12.—Jackson's record for yellow fever in 24 hours was broken yesterday, 11 cases being reported to the board of health. Of these eight are white and three colored. The cases are not confined to any one locality, but are distributed in various sections of the country, denoting the thorough spread of the infection.

Responses to the appeal of the relief association are coming in, but not as promptly as desired. Among other donations a \$50 check was received from Chief Engineer Russell Freeman, of the battleship Indiana, who is a Mississippian.

The official report of Secretary Hunter of the state board of health is as follows:

Taylor, no new cases, three seriously ill.

Poplarville, seven new cases developed.

Starkville, no new cases; five of them in all.

Madison reports new four cases, one white and three colored.

Natchez reports the two cases there as convalescent with no suspicious sickness.

Two suspicious cases are reported at Columbus. Marine Hospital Surgeon Murray has been sent to investigate them.

Harrison, 13 new cases and one death. Hermannville, one new case. The state board has issued an order removing quarantine restrictions as to shipments of freight between infected points within the state, and also between New Orleans and Jackson.

Record in Louisiana.

New Orleans, Oct. 12.—President Souchon makes the following report for Louisiana:

New Orleans, two cases, no deaths.

Franklin, 16 new cases, no deaths.

Wilson, 10 new cases, three of which are in a critical state.

Houma, seven new cases, one death.

Alexandria, seven new cases, one death.

MORE KICKS COME FROM VOLUNTEERS.

One Soldier Tells of the Gross Neglect of the Sick Confined in the Hospitals at Ponce.

New York, Oct. 12.—The transport Oblam, which sailed from Ponce, Porto Rico, Sept. 28, via Santiago, has arrived here. The transport had 250 sick and convalescent soldiers and 75 passengers.

After leaving Santiago where fire in her coal bunkers had to be extinguished, a fire again broke out in the coal bunkers and although every effort was made to get under control, was still smoldering when the Oblam reached Quarantine. It caused much uneasiness as the transport had stored in her hold a very large number of rifles.

Ralph Harwick of Dubois, Pa., a member of the Pennsylvania volunteers, told a harrowing story of the treatment he and his companions had received while in Porto Rico.

"We got there on July 28," he said, "and were landed from the transport Mobile. Many of us had contracted typhoid fever in the south. The tropical climate developed the disease, but notwithstanding our weakened condition the sixteenth made a good fight when it encountered the Spaniards. The regiment was under fire for over an hour and at the close of the engagement 13 Spaniards had been killed and 65 wounded.

"We deserved better treatment than we got when Ponce had been taken. The regulars were well looked after, but the volunteers were starved. When finally the men were forced to succumb to the fever and were sent to the hospitals they were treated most shamefully. Although delirious we were forced to get out of our cots to watch some poor brave fellow dying. Some of the men went mad under this strain. Only think of it—delirious men nursing the dying."

Harwick's story was but a sample of the complaints which were recited by the men to Governor Hastings after they had been transferred from the Oblam.

Governor Hastings was reluctant to make public his views regarding the treatment the soldiers from his state claimed to have received.

A New Trade Sprung Up.

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—A new trade with the Philippine Islands has sprung up. During the past six or seven weeks no less than 50 carloads of beer and six carloads of cigarettes have been sent there. The articles are for the use of the American soldiers, though it is expected that the shipments may be welcomed by the natives.

Injured by a Mob.

Texarkana, Tex., Oct. 12.—Information reaches here from Rochelle, La., that Waverly Whitaker, a former resident of this city, and extensively known in the lumber and the circles of Texas, was attacked by a mob at his sawmill near Rochelle and seriously injured.

To Marry a Nobleman.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Miss Annie M. Fowler, who served as a Red Cross nurse in Cuba, is to be married today to Albert Van Shelle, a Belgian nobleman, delegate general of the Red Cross society on the staff of his majesty, Leopold II.
