LAND AND RENTAL AGENT

Court Will Decide the Constitution Does Not Follow the Flag.

THE BENCH DIVIDED.

There Will Be Five Individual Opinions, but Some Will Be Concurrent With the Majority, Which is Ratification.

Washington, May 24.—The decision of the supreme court of the United States, it is asserted, will be that the constitution does not follow the flag. This decision, the most important that great tribunal has ever made, will be handed down next Monday. The decision will be in favor of the government, but by a divided bench.

There will be at least five individual opinions, but some of these are concurring opinions, expressing the views of the writers more fully and particularly than will be done in the opinion of the majority. The court will go back to the period in which the republic was formed and the constitution framed and endeavor to ascertain what was the intent of the framers of the nation.

The opinion of the majority of the court will dispose of the uniform taxation clause of the constitution which has been revoked by all the appellants in these cases.

The framers of the constitution, the opinion will say, in writing that clause had no thought of its application to territorial possessions. No such question as is now presented had arisen in their mind. The clause, "all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States," the court will hold, was placed in the constitution as a result of the jealousy of the states which united in forming the nation. It was intended to prevent any state or combination of states securing advantage over another or others; to prevent the ports of one state gaining preference over those of another in the importation of goods.

This rule of uniformity was made primarily for the states united, the court will hold, not for territories, then possessed or afterwards acquired, and the constitutional requirement is satisfied as long as all duties on imports are uniformly imposed at all the ports throughout the United States. The advantage of this uniformity may be extended to territories and possessions not states and members of the union but that is for congress to determine under the authority of the constitution.

Waldseeer Will Leave Peking.
Berlin, May 24.—The statement in London newspapers that Count von Waldseeer had informed the Chinese authorities that he would not leave Peking until the court returns and he has had an interview with Emperor Kwang Su, are authoritatively denied. Officials here say Von Waldseeer will leave Peking on May 31, or a few days later for Japan. It is uncertain whether he will return by the way of the United States or via Shanghai. Germany is trying to charter vessels for the return of her troops. The German contingent remaining in the province of Pei Chi Li will be less numerous than the British or French forces.

Corstelyn to Succeed Smith.
San Francisco, May 24.—The Chronicle publishes a dispatch from Washington stating that George F. Corstelyn, secretary to the president, will succeed Postmaster General Smith, who is soon to retire. Secretary Corstelyn would neither affirm or deny the report. Members of the presidential party, however, who had conversed on the subject with Postmaster General Smith before leaving Washington said he had no intention of retiring.

New Korean Ministers.
Washington, May 24.—Min Hui Cho the new Korean minister to the United States, accompanied by three legation attaches, has arrived in Washington. No arrangements have been made as yet for the new ministers' presentation to the state department.

Will Return to Philippines.
Washington, May 24.—Instead of being assigned to duty in the United States upon the expiration of their present leave of absence, Brigadier General Fred D. Grant and Major General J. G. Bates will return to their stations in the Philippines.

Alabama Bank Suspended.
Montecello, Ala., May 24.—The Shelby County bank has suspended payment. A notice was posted on the door saying such action was due to withdrawal of cash and the failure to collect promptly and that the suspension was temporary.

Only Greeted by Officials.
London, May 24.—Sir Alfred Milne arrived at Southampton today from South Africa. He did not receive the welcome the government had hoped for him. Officials greeted him, but public enthusiasm was lacking.

Will Keep Pledges.
Montgomery, Ala., May 24.—The constitutional convention has unanimously pledged itself to keep the pledges of the party and to submit any constitution framed to the people for ratification.

Ministerial Crisis in Spain.
Madrid, May 24.—A ministerial crisis is imminent as the result of election disturbances.

Rev. Aswood in Training.
Harrisburg, Pa., May 24.—Rev. H. C. Aswood, pastor of the Bridge Street African Methodist Episcopal church of Brooklyn, N. Y., has been found guilty of misappropriating church funds, suspension and conduct unbecoming a minister at a session of the Philadelphia conference of the African Methodist Episcopal church.
Following the verdict of the conference Dr. Aswood was arrested by a Harrisburg detective on a charge of defrauding a boarding house keeper in this city in August, 1899. He furnished bail for a hearing. Dr. Aswood was for seven years United States consul at San Domingo, and is one of the most prominent negroes in the country.

Limeoilum Combines.
New York, May 24.—It is reported that the American Lead and Oil company, which is now planning acquisition of the Limeoilum company will acquire a large number of limeoilum concerns. The report cannot be confirmed but it is known that a deal is in progress for consolidation of limeoilum. There are intimations that if the consolidation is accomplished it will be allied with, if not controlled by, the capitalists back of the Union Lead and Oil company.

Big Seizure of Game Birds.
New York, May 24.—State Game Protector John E. Overton claims he found in one room of the Arctic Freezing company's storage house 9000 partridges, quail, grouse and other game birds, the shooting or possession of which in the state out of season is punishable by a fine of \$50 for the first bird killed or held in possession and \$25 for the second or each bird thereafter. If the number found is quoted correctly the fines will exceed \$1,000,000.

Can Win a Cool Market.
Washington, May 24.—The United States has only to step in and win the market, says Consul F. D. Chester in communication to the state department in reference to the coal situation in Hungary. He says the coal question has become more important for Hungary which is a heavy importer of coal, that the problem of her industrial development.

Tanks for Texas Oil.
Pittsburg, May 24.—The J. M. Guffey Petroleum company of Texas has closed a contract with the Riter-Conley Manufacturing company of this city for ten tanks of 115,000 barrels capacity each. These tanks will be the largest ever manufactured. The contract approximates \$50,000.
