HON. T. M. CAMPBELL'S LETTER.

Hon. T. M. Campbell has with-
drawn from the race for governor,
owing, he says, to the fact that the
holding of early primaries in coun-
ties where he is least known and
understood deprive him of a full
and fair hearing before the people.
Continuing Col. Campbell says in
part:

"Grave questions are upon the

by a vicious land policy. Its prog-

porate interests, trusts are flour-

WENNER'S REPORT.

His Losses and Success Against
the Boers.

Jan. 28.—A long dispatch
from Kitchener, dated January 27, gives
details of military operations since
January 21. They are mostly unim-
portant, but indicative of continued
activity on the part of the Boers.

General Methuen's yeomanry got in
trouble near Rietol, western Trans-
vaal, and lost eight men killed, five
wounded and 41 made prisoners. The
latter since have been released.

This was offset by General Bruce
Hamilton's pursuit of the Boers in the
vicinity of Ermelo, Transvaal, result-
ing in the dispersal of a Boer laager
at Nelspan. Boer losses were two men
killed, four wounded and 94 made
prisoners, including Feld Coronet Dev-
illers, Captain De Jager and Lod-
wate, De Jager, a former member of
the first volksraad.

In addition Colonel Plummer captured
55 Boers.

The week's Boer losses were 31 men
killed, 23 wounded, 322 made prison-
ers and 53 men surrendered.

TRAIN HELD UP.

Two Iron Safes Loaded upon a Wagon
and Taken Away.

Charleston, Jan. 27.—Meager details
of a daring holdup on the Southern
railway near Branchville, which occur-
ed early Monday evening, have been
received here. As a northbound pas-
senger train from Charleston slowed
up two miles from Branchville, the en-
gineer, fireman and conductor were
compelled by masked men at the point
of pistols to stop. The robbers over-
awed the passengers, and, uncoupling
the engine, express and baggage cars
from the remainder of the train, ran
two miles up the road, where they load-
ed the two iron safes upon a 2-horse
wagon and drove away. The
express messenger was ordered by the
robbers to unlock the safes, but declar-
ed that he did not know the combina-
tion.

SAVED FROM LYNCHERS.

Fullblood Shawnee Tortured and Al-
most Buried at the Stake.

Guthrie, O. T., Jan. 28.—Fred Tiner,
a full-blood Shawnee Indian, alleged
to have outraged three Shawnee
squares on last Thursday, was tied to a
stake to be burned to death by mem-
bers of his tribe, men and women. He
was first cruelly tortured. His face
was beaten out of shape, his ears were
torn nearly off by squaws and other
horrible tortures were being applied
when Deputy United States Marshall
Davis arrived from Arbeka, I. T., held
the mob back with a gun, and single-
handed cut the thongs, backed away
from the crowd with his prisoner and
safely escaped to Weweka, where
Tiner was placed in jail.

Stamp on Free Papers.

Washington, Jan. 28.—The postoffice
department has been undertaking to
discipline the Commoner, Wm. J. Bryan's
paper. Some time ago Mr. Bryan
placed on his complimentary mail-
ing list the names of all senators and
representatives who were not already
subscribers to his paper. The depart-
ment rules that he must put a stamp
on all such free papers. It is held
that, while this free distribution is
not advertising wares, goods and mer-
chandise, it is advertising doctrines,
and comes within the rules regulating
second class postage.

Began Investigation.

Austin, Jan. 28.—The committee
created by the legislature to investi-
gate the departments and institutions
of the state held its first regular meet-
ing in the state capitol Monday. All of
the members of the committee were pres-
ent, namely: Hon. Travis Henderson,
chairman; Hon. W. T. Shannon, Hon.
S. R. Boyd, Hon. R. N. Stafford and
Hon. George W. Savage. W. R. Rounds,
one of the accountants chosen at the
Dallas meeting, was sworn in. Capt.
R. H. Bruce, the other accountant, did
not show up. The rate of compensa-
tion for the accountants has not yet
been fixed.

Must Abandon Tobacco.

Paris, Tex., Jan. 28.—Frisco pas-
senger trainmen must break themselves
of the tobacco habit before the 15th
of February, for on that date a new
code of rules and regulations goes into
effect, one section of which provides
that no passenger trainman shall use
tobacco in any form while in uniform
on duty, and no employee shall smoke
or chew tobacco in passenger stations
or about the platforms. The new
rules do not make much further
change. A few signals are altered
and new ones given in their place,
but the changes are easy.

Shot a Woman and Suicided.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 28.—Dr. Harry J.
Zeigler of 316 West King street, Lan-
caster, Pa., fatally wounded a woman
passing as his wife and then killed
himself at the Wellington hotel. A
note left by the physician declared that
he and his wife had decided to die and
that as he lacked the nerve Mrs. Zeig-
ler had promised to commit the act.
The woman, before being removed to
the hospital in a dying condition, de-
clared that the shooting was done by
her husband.

German Kills Himself.

Coriscana, Tex., Jan. 28.—Louis
Blum, a well-to-do German of this
city, was found dead at his home Mon-
day afternoon. By his side lay a shot-
gun, with which death had been in-
flicted, while portions of his skull and
brain were scattered around the room.
He was found by his wife, from whom
he separated some days ago. A talisman
was attached to the trigger, and it is
thought that Blum fired the gun with
his foot.
