### INVESTIGATION BEGUN.

Commission Looking into Alleged Discrimination Against Galveston. New Orleans, Sept. 12.—Members of the Texas railroad commission, L. J. Storey and Allison Mayfield, Freight Manager H. A. Jones of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio railroad; Secretary Johnson of the Galveston Chamber of Commerce and Commissioner Becker of the Houston Freight Bureau reached here Tuesday and escorted by freight representatives of the Southern Pacific and Texas Pacific roads are investigating local conditions in the matter of hauling cotton.

The purpose is to ascertain if Galveston is being discriminated against in any way from either the Southern or the Texas and Pacific roads.

### KEYES RELEASED.

Chief Desmond Does Not Believe He Threatened Folk's Life.

St. Louis, Sept. 12.—Alfred Keyes was arrested Thursday night by Detective Harrington on complaint of Dr. Schuchardt, who charges Keyes with threatening to kill Circuit Attorney Folk who is prosecuting the alleged bribe-taking members of the city council.

Keyes, when taken before Chief Desmond, admitted saying to Dr. Schuchardt that Charles Kratz, one of the missing combine men, was his friend, but denied that he made any allusion to Circuit Attorney Folk. Keyes said Dr. Schuchardt spoke disparagingly of Kratz and he defended him. Chief Desmond was convinced that Keyes meant no harm and permitted him to go.

### Anniversary of McKinley's Death.

Washington, Sept. 12.—The anniversary of the death of President McKinley next Sunday will be appropriately observed by a special service at the Metropolitan M. E. church, where he worshipped while in Washington. At other churches also addresses commemorative of the life and services of the lamented president will be made by the pastors. The district commissioners have asked the people and the churches to observe the day with appropriate services.

On a proclamation of Governor Odell services will be held throughout New York state on Sunday.

### She Wanted Notoriety.

London, Sept. 12.—Margery Kingston, a stylishly dressed woman, charged in police court at Gardiff, Wales, with disorderly conduct, created a great deal of excitement in court by claiming that she had purposely caused herself to be locked up in order to draw attention to her claim against the late duke of Clarence, brother of the prince of Wales, and asserting that she had lost her husband and children in order to save the duke's name and that now she had come all the way from India to get her rights.

### Alleged Lynchers Acquitted.

Leesburg, W. Va., Sept. 12.—The jury in the case of Charles Lowenbach, charged with complicity in the lynching of the negro Charles Craven on July 31, returned a verdict of acquittal after an absence of nine minutes from the courtroom. Craven was charged with the killing of a white man named Wilson, and his lynching aroused considerable indignation, a number of persons having been indicted for complicity in the affair.

### Annexation of Cuba.

New York, Sept. 12.—The Central News Agency of New York sends out the following: "Havana.—El Mundo says Palma is indignant. He makes public a confidential document from Secretary Root and others asking co-operation in the annexation of Cuba. He reveals the plans for a greater United States."

### Fall Six Stories.

Fort Worth, Tex., Sept. 12.—Phillip Webb, about 15 years of age, who was a water-carrier at the Swift & Co. packinghouses now under the course of erection, fell from the sixth story of one of the company's buildings, a distance of about 150 feet, and was instantly killed.

### Governor Pardons a Boy.

Sherman, Tex., Sept. 12.—The pardon for Marcus Ellison, aged 17 years, convicted in July last for theft of a calf, reached the sheriff's office Thursday and he will be released from the county jail. Governor Sayers makes the pardon a full and complete one.

### Miles Leaves for Philippines.

Washington, Sept. 12.—Lieutenant General Miles has left for the west and will sail from San Francisco on the transport Thomas to the Philippines, where he will make a tour of inspection of the army in the Philippines.
