FRANCE IS DISPLEASED

Does Not Relish Turkey Giving Germans Contracts.

NO MORE CASH LOANS

Deutsche Bank Will Furnish Sultan With Finances and Kaiser's Subjects Are to Secure Considerable Work.

Constantinople, Feb. 5.—The victory of Germany in capturing the contract for the rearmament of the Turkish artillery threatens to result in serious disturbance of Franco-Turkish political relations. The French ambassador here, M. Constant, proposes to leave Constantinople soon for Paris to consult with Foreign Minister Delcasse. Meanwhile the ambassador has informed the Turkish government that the French market is closed to any fresh Turkish loan.

Twefik Pasha, foreign minister, tried to compromise the matter, offering to settle the Syrian railway question in a manner chiefly favorable to French claimants and to purchase military equipment to the amount of \$2,300,000 in France. The ambassador, however, demanded the expenditure of \$6,000,000, being one-third the value of the new armament, with French gun factories, and complete satisfaction of France's demands regarding railroads. These terms the ambassador declared to be final, and not having received a reply up to Feb. 6, the ambassador informed the Turkish government that he refused to continue negotiations, adding that the French market was closed to further Turkish loans. As a result of this notification, the Ottoman bank withdrew its proposals for a projected loan and notified Minister of Finance Rehsad Pasha that it would not entertain any request of the government for advances. The Deutsche bank then came to the port's aid with an offer to assist the treasurer. The Germans thus are in complete possession of the financial field and an iride has already been promulgated ordering the purchase of all new guns in German factories, but it has been decided only to rearm sixty batteries at present instead of 142, as originally proposed.

FAVOR OF AMERICA.

Privy Council Reverses Judgments in Greene-Gaynor Case.

London, Feb. 5.—The privy council rendered its decision Wednesday in the Greene-Gaynor case in favor of the American government. The council reversed two judgments of Justice Caron at Quebec of Aug. 13, 1902, and ordered respondents to pay costs of appeal. The council's decision caustically criticizes the action of Justice Caron in releasing Green and Gaynor and Caron's "extraordinary intervention" and adds: "Where a prisoner is brought before a competent tribunal charged with an extradition offense and remanded for express purpose of affording the prosecution an opportunity of bringing forward evidence whereby the accusation is to be supported, if in such case, upon a writ of habeas corpus, the learned judge treats the demand warrant as duly and proceeds to adjust the case as though the whole evidence was before him, it paralyzes the administration of justice and renders it impossible for proceedings in extradition to be effective."

John R. Carter, second secretary of the American embassy, was present to hear the decision of the supreme court of Canada in the case of the fishing steamer Kitty Dee, captured by a Canadian cruiser on Lake Erie. John F. Gaynor and Benj. D. Green, indicted in Savannah, Ga., Dec. 8, 1899, were charged with embezzlement and defrauding the United States government, together with Captain Oberlin M. Carter, in the performance of government contracts for the improvement of the Savannah river and other river and harbor work in that district. Alleged illicit profits being estimated at \$2,000,000, Gaynor and Green were arrested. They contested extradition to Georgia, and when the United States commissioner decided they must go to that state and plead to indictments they fled to Canada. They have been at liberty on \$40,000 bail each and this is forfeited.

PROTOCOL SIGNED.

Provides For Responsibility of San Domingo's Finances by United States.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Minister Dawson has cabled the state department from San Domingo that the new protocol providing for responsibility of San Domingo's finances by the United States has been signed. The document is expected here early next week and will be submitted immediately to the senate. It is drawn on the lines of the original protocol so far as it concerns the administration of customs by officials designated by the United States and segregation of a portion of the customs receipts to defray the foreign indebtedness of the country. No date is set in the document for the beginning of the administration and that will be left for the senate to insert.

MUCH ENTHUSIASM.

Citizens of Arizona Delighted With the Passage of Statehood Bill.

Phoenix, Ariz., Feb. 5.—The action of the senate with respect to statehood has aroused much enthusiasm and satisfaction is expressed. The opinion is generally expressed that Arizona's chance for admission has been greatly improved by the favorable action as to New Mexico and that the territory will be limited by the Fifty-ninth congress.
