BUSINESS SUSPENDED.

Four Hundred Winchesters Are Sold to Citizens of Brownsville.

Houston, Aug. 17.—A special from Brownsville says: Further trouble is feared here with the negro troops. A citizens' guard of 150 men is stationed between this city and Fort Brown, and if the soldiers attempt to leave the garrison it is the avowed purpose of the citizens to shoot them down. Four hundred Winchesters have been sold to citizens, and they report that the officers of the garrison are themselves afraid of the negro soldiers, which has determined the citizens to take no chances. Many people are leaving their homes on the side of the city near Fort Brown. An additional appeal is being made to Gov. Hanham to send state troops. Business is entirely suspended in this city. The Texas National guard troops, now attending maneuvers at Camp Mabry, are said to be clamoring to be sent to Brownsville.

Sensational rumors have excited the militiamen, and it is now declared that the negro soldiers committed the acts in Brownsville in retaliation. It is said to be the intention of the Texas militiamen to use ball cartridges in the event of the United States permitting the negro troops to participate in the maneuvers at Camp Mabry. Adjutant General Hulen considers it unwise to send state troops to Brownsville.
