District Court Proceedings.

District court convened this morning at 10 o'clock with his honor, Judge J. C. Russell on the bench, and the following officers of the court: Hon. Jno. I. Klieber, district attorney; Louis Kowalski, district clerk; E. C. Forto, sheriff.

The following members of the Brownsville bar were on hand: Jas. B. Wells, C. H. Maria, R. B. Rentfro, E. H. Goodrich, Frank Feuille, W. H. Mason, F. W. Seabury and County Attorney Augustin Celaya. Judge J. R. Monroe, of Rio Grande City was present.

The following deputy sheriffs were sworn to summon jurors: Telesforo Garza, Felipe Cobb, George Connor and Miguel Treviño.

A venire of sixteen grand jurors were ordered summoned by the court, writ returnable Monday, Feb. 13, jurors to appear same day. Venires of 24 petit jurors for second, third and fourth weeks were also ordered. The civil docket was set for tomorrow, and criminal docket set for Monday, Feb. 20.

F. W. Seabury, Esq., was appointed by the court as guardian to represent interest of the minor Carl H. Leube, in proceeding to remove the disabilities of said minor.

Two cases against Maximiano Benavidez were dismissed; defendant having already been convicted of murder in Nueces county.

Court then adjourned until tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

MORE GARZA NEWS.

A Garza Captain Surrenders And One is Captured. Special to THE HERALD.

Fert Ringgold, Feb. 7.—Captain Santos Cadena, a very prominent member of the Garza gang, and his son, Apelinio Cadena, surrendered on the 6th instant to Lieut. Slocum and United States Deputy Marshal O'Donnell. They were brought into town and put under bond to appear at San Antonio. Captain Estevan Benavidez and Severino Moreno of Cadena's company were captured by Lieut. West and deputy United States marshal, James Arnold, last night and they are now in custody here awaiting examination. All of these parties took part in the San Ignacio fight, and the last two named took part in the skirmish near Roma.
