RAIN AT RIO GRANDE.

Interesting Military Items from
Fort Ringgold.

Fort Ringgold, Tex., April 17.—
A nice shower fell here this morn-
ing. It still rains slightly, and
looks as if it would continue, which
is anxiously hoped for.

We are awaiting the return of
the troops from hunting Garzantes,
as there none to be hunted just
now, and the troops are only wait-
ing orders to return to posts. But
one troop and some scouts will keep
a standing camp at Carrizo. Most
of the troops now in the field will
be divided up and among this and
Fort Brown and intermediate points
as in case of another outbreak these
are the worst places, besides being
much nearer in case of need than
Fort Clark or San Antonio.

Military Items.

San Antonio Express (April 14.)

Colonel Peter D. Vroom, inspec-
tor general of the department, reach-
ed headquarters yesterday. He vi-
sited Forts Brown, Ringgold and Mc-
Intosh to make the regular annual
inspection of those posts.

First Lieutenant John W.
Heard, Third cavalry, from camp
at Realitos, where his troop is at
present encamped, is at the post.
He was called in to appear as wit-
ness before the United States
court.

Brigadier General Frank Whea-
ton, commander of this military de-
partment, accompanied by aide-de-
camp, First Lieutenant John S.
Mallory, Second infantry, return-
ed to headquarters last night. The
general left here March 26 for a
visit to all of the posts and troops
in the field along the Rio Grande.
