SIGN THOSE NOTES.

THE HERALD is reliably informed that many of the bonus notes still remain unsigned. Why the subscribers should longer delay putting their signature to a note for the amounts they have promised to give to secure the railroad is to us a mystery. It can only delay the consummation of the purpose for which the money or lands were promised, and may even endanger the success of the enterprise. Mr. Miller has been written that everything is ready at Corpus Christi and his presence is awaited there, and we are assured that any delay on his part in leaving New York is caused by his desire to have everything in readiness that the work on the railroad may begin at once. Imagine then what will be his vexation upon reaching Corpus to find that the notes at this end of the line have not been signed, and he must wait perhaps some weeks for this preliminary to be attended to. We should not be surprised if he should become disgusted and throw up the project entirely, for he has indulged our people by extending the time originally allowed for raising the bonus. Why then, do you delay signing the notes? Why do not the committees who are entrusted with this important matter use their influence in having this particular attended to? There is no excuse whatever for delay, but there is great danger in it. We sincerely hope that those who have not yet done so will at once come forward and sign notes for the amounts they have promised. Should Mr. Miller fail in carrying out his contract the notes will not in any way be binding upon the signers, and he will certainly not undertake the work unless the notes are signed.

And one thing further, it has been repeatedly pointed out of late that, although there is an abundance of money in New York, yet it is almost impossible to obtain means to carry out such enterprises as building railroad, etc. Yet Mr. Sidney G. Miller, a man with a wide reputation as an honorable gentleman and as a successful railroad builder, in the midst of this great business depression, has come down here and offered to furnish or obtain the enormous amount necessary for the construction of this railroad. We think we are not extravagant when we say that Mr. Miller must be one of very limited number who could at such a time command the necessary means, and our people should appreciate the fact that this section is favored beyond almost any other in having this grand opportunity presented to it at the present time. In view of these facts, we cannot understand how any of those who are to receive the benefits of this enterprise, and this includes every soul residing in this section, can daily for one moment with the opportunity, or risk losing it by delay.
