EDWARD ADAM'S CASE.

San Antonio Express.

Dr. G. G. Clifford returned yes-

terday from the City of Mexico,

where he went accompanied by other

well known San Antonio citizens

in the interest of Edward Adams,

who killed a waiter in a restaurant

in the capital of Mexico about four

years ago and has been in Balem

prison there ever since, awaiting

final disposition of his case. D.

Clifford was called upon by a re-

porter for the Express and asked

in regard to the interesting case

he said:

"The situation is this: The Su-

preme Court of Mexico has affirmed

the finding of the lower court, sen-

tencing Mr. Adams to death. The

decree has not yet been signed nor

the sentence passed. Sentence will

be passed as soon as the judge signs

the docket and the case will then

go before President Diaz upon pe-

tition for commutation of sentence.

The United States government,

through Minister Isaac P. Gray,

has already presented a petition

asking that the sentence be commu-

ted. This will be followed by a pe-

tition from Mr. Adams through

attorneys to the President as soon

as the docket is signed. The Pres-

ident will then take action."

Dr. Clifford states that he visited

Adams in prison and that he bears

but little traces of his four years of

confinement.

"He stated to me," said the doc-

tor, "that he had been kindly treat-

ed by the prison officials and that

he had no complaint to find with

anyone."

The doctor spent only a few days

in Mexico, but he reports having a

very enjoyable time. He states that

the people of the Mexican capital

are the most hospitable he ever

met. "They have a high regard for

Americans and welcome them to

that country," said he.
