The schooner James Andrew has arrived at Point Isabel from Rockport with a cargo of flour for Benj. Kowalski, the commission merchant. The James Andrew will proceed down the Mexican coast to Tampico for a load of fruit to carry back to Rockport.

The concert given by the citizens of Matamoros last evening was a pronounced success. Nearly a hundred persons went over from Brownsville to enjoy the concert, and on all sides today are heard expressions of approbation regarding the excellence of the program. The large opera house was filled with an intelligent and appreciative audience and with such encouragement the performers, amongst whom were many of great talent, did their respective parts unusually well for amateurs. The sum realized for the benefit of the city hospital must be quite large.

Mexican oranges are scarce in this market this season. The reason is that they are now being shipped from Tampico and Victoria, Tamaulipas, to various points in the United States where they command good prices. Doubtless the shippers realize much greater profits than can be made by sending the fruit overland by carts to Matamoros, and as the winter crop can be shipped North and still not fill the demand, naturally the supply for this region is cut off. The Florida orange groves are not bearing since the great freeze last January, and hence the market supply is limited.

CLEVELAND MESSAGE.
[Concluded.]

President Cleveland explains the necessity of the Morgan syndicate contract for gold to maintain the reserve fund, and declares that if at its special session in July congress had authorized the issuance of three per cent bonds, \$16,000,000 would have been saved.

Between 1879 and 1890 but \$268,000,000 of gold was withdrawn from the treasury, while between 1890 and 1896 the amount reaches \$375,000,000. This is attributed to the increased purchase of silver. Under these conditions, the government has incurred a bonded indebtedness of \$95,000,000 in establishing the gold reserve and expended \$62,315,400 in an effort to maintain it, besides an annual interest of \$11,000,000.

The relief measures suggested by the president embody a recommendation that the greenbacks, which now afford speculators an opportunity to deplete the treasury of gold whenever it suits their purposes, be retired and bonds of small denominations bearing low interest be issued in their stead. The secretary of the treasury should be empowered to sell bonds abroad for gold in order to cancel these notes. The amount of currency thus withdrawn should not be over \$166,000,000, which would be supplied with gold. The president suggests as a relief to circulation that banks be allowed to issue notes to the full amount of bonds deposited and tax on their circulation reduced to one fourth of one per cent. As a further relief it is suggested that revenue collections be made payable in gold. Not to pay out United States treasury notes on demand and to insist upon paying in silver notes would injure the parity between gold and silver which the government is bound to maintain. As the withdrawal of gold by foreign investors is a direct result of fright concerning the solvency of the government, there is nothing to alleviate the situation unless it is legislation which will lessen the desire for gold.

Speaking of the proposition to relieve the financial situation by the free coinage of silver at a ratio of 16 to 1, the president declares that no act of legislation has ever been able to hold silver and gold together in free coinage at a ratio of such difference from that which is established in the markets of the world. A change to silver monometallism would cause a collapse of our entire credit system.
