THE GREENVILLE CENSUS.
Report From Washington Only Gives 8,850 Population.

The population of Greenville, Hunt county, Texas, as shown by the report from Washington yesterday is only 8,850, as compared with 9,800 ten years ago, a gain of only 1,000, or 20 per cent. The census of 1880 gave Greenville 4,300.

There is undoubtedly a mistake in the figures, as a census of Greenville was taken several years ago and the population at that time was a little over 10,000, and the figures, together with the names of the inhabitants of Greenville, were submitted to the legislature which granted the city a special charter. A town has to have 10,000 inhabitants or over before a special charter can be secured. The census of the city for the special report was taken about five or six years ago and the town has increased wonderfully in population during the last two or three years. The Greenville Booster Club claims a population of 15,000 population and the figures as shown by the postoffice force as the people to whom mail is delivered is nearly 12,000.

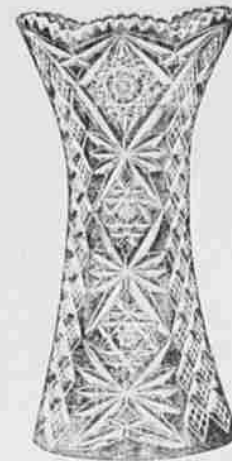

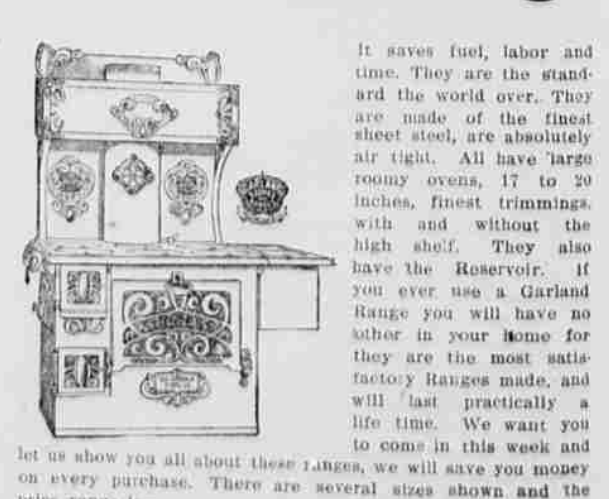
