#### COULD WIN IN NEW ENGLAND.

Senator Gardner of Maine Inderses New York Colleague's View That New Jersey Governor Is Strong In Sections Where Foes Say He Is Weak.

[Atlanta (Ga.) Journal.] Senator O'Gorman of New York declares that Woodrow Wilson if chosen the Democratic nominee can carry that state against any Republican.
