I wonder if he thinks we never saw gravel roads and has come to our county to teach us how to farm, raise live stock and work the public roads. If he has, I invite him out in Dist. 2, where I work the roads, and I will give him a good job as water boy at 40 cents per day. I guess tin Lizzie. If that is the case, it is lucky be bad a Lizzie instead of a car, for he can get the parts at most any 5 and 10 cent store. If his Lizzie was crippled on any roads I work and he will send me the bill I will gladly pay it.

I will admit the roads of our county are not yet up to specifica tions, but the contractors have only had a lew months under the new contracts to work in, and it has been bad weather nearly all the time; but in less than two years they will all be up to the specifications, and this county will bave as good dirt roads as are found anywhere.
