ROBBED AN OFFICER.

Deputy Sheriff Is Looking for the Man Who Stole His Cotton.

J. H. Alexander, who lives a few miles from the city, is anxious to locate a man who is supposed to have taken several hundred pounds of cotton from a wagon in his field the other night. Mr. Alexander holds a commission as deputy under Sheriff Minnick and since the convening of district court he has been beating the brush for grand jury witnesses. During the pretty weather which has prevailed this week he has had pickers at work gathering the remnant of his cotton. As the staple was jerked from the bolls it was emptied in a wagon in the field preparatory to being hauled to the gin. The other morning when the pickers went to the field to begin work they discovered a large hole in the cotton in which a man is supposed to have slept the night before. From one end of the wagon several hundred pounds of the staple had been taken. In the excavation which had been made in the cotton a carefully folded note was found. The little epistle was addressed to the owner of the cotton, thanking him for the comfortable quarters provided for a man who was in hard luck. The writer gave a street address in Brooklyn and added that if the recipient of the note would call there he would receive royal treatment.

Mr. Alexander would like very much to locate his cotton, but he has no idea of going to Brooklyn to look for it.
