THE SPORTING WORLD

FINAL ARRANGEMENTS COM- PLETED FOR PACIFIC RE-

LAY RACE MEET.

San Francisco, Mar. 6.—Final ar-
rangements were completed today
by the Pacific Athletic Association
for the great relay race meet, the
first of its kind to be held on this
coast, which is scheduled for tomor-
row. The event will run exactly as
that of the University of Pennsyl-
vania's famous relay meet on Frank-
lin Field, Philadelphia, and has at-
tracted the best runners of this sec-
tion of the country.

Another important event in Pacific
coast athletics tomorrow will be the
intercollegiate meet between Stan-
ford University and the University of
Southern California in Los Angeles.
This meet marks the beginning of
the track season for the Stanford
team. The complete schedule fol-
lows:

Saturday, March 7, University of
Southern California vs. Stanford, at
Los Angeles; Saturday, March 14,
Olympic Club vs. Stanford, on cam-
pus; Saturday, March 21, University
of Southern California vs. Stanford,
on campus; Friday, March 27, Po-
mona College vs. Stanford on cam-
pus; Saturday, March 28, freshmen
intercollegiate meet at Berkeley;
Saturday, April 18, varsity intercol-
legiate meet, on campus.

Georgetown Athletic Meet.

Washington, March 6.—George-
town university will undoubtedly
have the greatest athletic meet ever
held under the colors of the Blue and
Gray in Convention hall tomorrow,
practically all the leading institu-
tions of the east and the south hav-
ing entered men. Yale, Princeton,
Columbia, Wesleyan and Virginia
will be on hand with large teams.
Vanderbilt University is expected to
send a relay team to make the first
appearance of the Tennessee institu-
tion in eastern track athletics. St.
Louis University has entered its
cracks, as has the University of No-
tredame, Cornell, Pennsylvania,
Wesleyan, Brown, Washington and
Lee and John Hopkins will be repre-
sented by teams or individuals.

Georgetown and Virginia will
meet for the championship of the
South in one of the five relay races
arranged.

Harvard Track Team.

Cambridge, Mass., March 6.—
Harvard track team will open its
season tomorrow with an indoor car-
nival in Hemenway gymnasium.
Other dates on the schedule are as
follows:

April 11, handicap games, Soldiers
Field; 17th, class games, Soldiers
Field; May 2, New England inter-
scholastic championships, Soldiers
Field; Dartmouth, Soldiers Field;
16th, Yale, Soldiers Field; 29th,
and 30th, intercollegiate meet.

Soccer Teams to Meet.

New York, March 6.—Columbia's
soccer team will go to Philadelphia
tomorrow, where a game will be
played with the University of Penn-
sylvania. The Morningside institu-
tion has a strong team and the men
are confident of winning from the
Quakers. The complete Columbia
soccer schedule is as follows:

Tomorrow, University of Penn-
sylvania, at Philadelphia; 8th, Haver-
ford, at Haverford; 14th, Yale at
New Haven; 21st, Cornell at South
Field; 28th, Harvard at Cambridge.

Immediately following the ad-
journment of the postmasters the
Republican club of Ellis county held
an enthusiastic meeting. It was in
the nature of a love feast for the
faithfully few, and all present were
loyal republicans. This meeting was
for the purpose of the members get-
ting better acquainted with each
other, to revive interest in the party,
to work for an increased mem-
bership and to comfort one another
in anticipation of the defeat that is
in store for their national ticket next
November.
